## Odds & Ends from Rick Smith, Township Manager

#### **Q&A** on Soliciting in East Goshen

- Q Do I need a permit to solicit in East Goshen?
- A Yes, a permit is required to solicit in East Goshen Township.
- Q How do I know if someone has a permit?
- A The soliciting permits issued by the Township contain a photo of the person along with their name and the name of the company they represent. The person doing the soliciting must display their permit while soliciting in the Township.
- Q When can people solicit?
- A Monday through Friday (9:00 am to 8:00 pm), Saturday (9:00 am to 6:00 pm) and Sunday (noon to 6:00 pm).
- Q Can the Board of Supervisors prohibit soliciting?
- A No, however, you as a resident can prohibit soliciting at your residence.

- Q How can I do that?
- A Complete the Solicitors Do Not Call application (available at the Township Building or at www.eastgoshen.org) and submit it to the Township. We distribute a copy of the Solicitors Do Not Call List with the soliciting permit, and permit holders are advised to check the web page for updates.
- Q I am on the Solicitors Do Not Call List, but I still have people soliciting.
- A Call the police.
- Q I am on the Solicitors Do Not Call List, but I still have people coming to my residence asking me to support a person running for election or asking me to contact my legislator and express my support for a specific piece of legislation.
- A The above is not be considered "soliciting" as that term is defined in the Township Code and is a permitted activity pursuant to the Freedom of Speech clause in the Constitution.

#### Pedestrian Crossings on Paoli Pike

There are two pedestrian crossings at the East Goshen Park and Section 3542 of the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code reads as follows:

#### § 3542. Right-of-way of pedestrians in crosswalks.

- (a) General rule.--When traffic-control signals are not in place or not in operation, the driver of a vehicle shall yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection.
- **(b)** Exercise of care by pedestrian.--No pedestrian shall suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close as to constitute a hazard.
- (c) Limitation on vehicles passing.--Whenever any vehicle is stopped at any crosswalk at an intersection or at any marked crosswalk to permit a pedestrian to cross the roadway, the driver of any other vehicle approaching from the rear shall not overtake and pass the stopped vehicle.
- (d) Application of section.--Subsection (a) does not apply under the conditions stated in section 3543(b) (relating to pedestrians crossing at other than crosswalks).
- (e) **Penalties.--** The driver of a vehicle who violates subsection (a) commits a summary offense and shall, upon conviction, be sentenced to pay a fine of \$50.

## News from the Westtown-East Goshen Police Department

On March 30, 2016, the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission (PLEAC) voted unanimously to award accreditation status to the Westtown-East Goshen Regional Police Department. The achievement of accreditation was the culmination of a year of intense work by members of the police department and places the department among the 8% of all law enforcement agencies in Pennsylvania that have received accreditation through PLEAC.

The Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association introduced the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Program in July of 2001. The program was designed and developed by professional law enforcement executives to provide a reasonable and cost effect plan for the professionalization of law enforcement agencies in Pennsylvania. There are many benefits associated with accreditation including decreased liability insurance expenditures, reduced agency risk and exposure to lawsuits, improved community relations, and increased agency accountability to the public.

In order to become accredited, an agency must demonstrate that it meets the 132 standards developed by PLEAC. To meet these standards, the agency must present evidence to a team of assessors that the agency has a policy in place to address each standard and that officers are stringently complying with the policy. These standards include important areas such as procedures relating to patrol operations, vehicle pursuits, use of force, detention of prisoners, and property/evidence control.

In order to retain accreditation status, the department must undergo a reaccreditation assessment every three years. The on-going accreditation process


will guarantee that the department continually reviews and revises departmental procedures, thereby ensuring that the Westtown-East Goshen Regional Police Department is in compliance with the national best practices in policing.

The police department would like to thank the elected officials of East Goshen, Westtown, and Thornbury Townships and the citizens of the townships for their support and encouragement during the accreditation process.

## THE LATEST NEWS FROM THE PARK AND RECREATION COMMISSION

y the time this newsletter hits your mailbox, schools will be in their final week, plans for summer vacations will be in full swing, and the parks will be abuzz with activity. The Park Commission is proud to report that recent plans to improve recreational assets and opportunities within East Goshen Township are beginning to bear fruit. We were recently notified that the Paoli Pike Trail project received a \$1,000,000 Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) grant and a \$150,000 Chester County Municipal Grant. A number of additional grant applications have been submitted, and we eagerly await their decisions. When complete, the Paoli Pike Trail will connect the parks, corporate and municipal complexes, as well as the Goshen Village Shopping Center and WCASD schools along a safe bicycle and pedestrian pathway that will benefit the entire East Goshen Township community for many years to come. In anticipation of the Paoli Pike Trail and in review of current park policies, please note that bicycles, skateboards and scooters are allowed in Applebrook Park, but not in East Goshen Park.

If you've been in the park this spring, you may have noticed the Public Works Department hard at work! Its major park project has been finishing a renovation to the back three tennis courts. They have also removed a host of invasive plant species and planted native wild flowers in their place!



A number of great Township-sponsored events will find a home in East Goshen Park this summer, too many to list here! To see a complete list visit www.eastgoshen.org or our Facebook page! There is one weekend, unofficially dubbed "the coolest weekend ever in East Goshen Park", planned for August 26th and 27th! We kick off the weekend Friday, August 26th with a showing of Star Wars: The Force Awakens, complete with an appearance by Darth Vader! Come armed with your light sabers! If that isn't enough - that Saturday, August 27th, is Community Day! We have a new band this year, Not Quitting Our Days Jobs, more food trucks planned, and a Silent Disco area! ## Of Wheelwrights and Blacksmiths, the Original Business of East Goshen

ith summer just around the corner, finding things do in East Goshen outside the park can be difficult. What many don't realize is there are hidden treasures throughout East Goshen. The Blacksmith Shop and the Plank House are only two of those treasures.

When the Blacksmith shop was first built in 1740, it was a wheelwright shop. A wheelwright shop produced the wooden wheels for carts and wagons.

Wheel making involved three main steps. First, the hub at the center of the wheel was crafted. Next, the spokes were crafted to radiate out from the hub. Finally, the rim was made to connect all the pieces into a wheel.

The wood used in this type of wheel varied depending on the region and what types of wood was available. For carts and wagons in the Chester County, three types of wood were used to craft the wheels. Elm was used for the hub because of its interwoven grain; this type

of grain prevents the hub from splitting when the spokes are driven into it. The amount of force that is used to drive the spokes in can cause

other types of wood to split. Oak was used for the spokes because it doesn't bend or compress and it transfers the load pressures directly from the rim to hub. Ash was used for the rim because of its flexibility and springiness. The ash acts as a form of suspension and protects against shock damage. Generally, the wheels were bound by steel or iron, which is why the blacksmith shop was added to the wheelwright shop in 1750. It only made sense to have both together.

In their heyday, the blacksmith and the wheelwright were responsible for not only reinforcing wheels, but also for repairing wagon bodies and hitches and repairing and sharpening farm tools. In addition, the blacksmith was responsible for shoeing horses.

Various local artisans, in period attire, will demonstrate their trades, while visitors learn the games and crafts that were loved by early Americans. Visitors can shop at the stalls of our food vendors, who will be featuring foods that were popular in the Federal Period, and our artisans, who will demonstrate the crafts and trades of the early residents of East Goshen.

If you cannot join us for Artisans Day, both The Blacksmith Shop and the Plank House are open for tours from May to June and September to October on Saturdays from 10am to 2pm.

#### ARTIFICIAL SUPPORT

2015 was a banner year for fruit production from our trees. Whether they were acorns, apples, walnuts or beech nuts, the results were bountiful! Fruit tree owners are often faced with a decision about how to care for their trees to ensure that every year is as fruitful as the last.

When trees are overburdened by extreme fruit production, heavy wet snowfalls or just from being created

by the hands of man as a "cultivar", trees can run into structural issues and it can be tempting to use some form of artificial support to ensure that fruit can grow. If you hadn't propped up that over-laden branch from the apple tree with that 2 by 12 inch board, it certainly would have snapped under the weight.

When trees grow, they expand outward. Each year brings an increase in circumference. In the case of multi-leader (tree trunk) trees, the individual leaders initiate from a crotch. These crotches or divisions can be shaped like the letter U, or like a V. In the case of V crotches, one side of a leader impinges upon the other with extreme force. At the same time, the upper canopy sections from each leader extend outwards in opposite directions, growing for uncontested, available light. This puts a great deal of strain on the main crotch. The pressure builds on an annual basis, as does the weight and extension of the upper canopy. This tree needs only a straight-line wind shear, ice storm or bad luck to come crashing down.

This is where artificial support can be applied. The more conventional method involves the installation of non-retrievable hardware that is drilled into the opposing sides and connected by steel wire.

These steel cables can hold thousands of pounds of weight and will do their intended job for decades.

It is hard to believe that the support cables could increase their holding power, but that's exactly what happens in the first year or two of their existence as an element of the tree's support system.

The tree will go through the stages of compartmentalization. This is the phenomenon whereby trees heal themselves after being damaged or having limbs removed by property owners or contractors. The tree will callus around the anchoring hardware, holding it more firmly than the original installation. Once secured, the support cable can go on assisting in the structural integrity of the tree for decades.

There are also newer types of support systems that utilize broad nylon bands that go around the leaders of the tree rather than being secured by hardware. This nylon system is touted as being less invasive to the host. And while this may be true initially, I have found that these bands of fabric, if not moved after a period of time, will girdle the tree in the areas where they have contact. It is quite possible that the manufacturers of these systems include instructions that the bands have to be moved after so many years. In the most recent case where I ran into a badly damaged tree where the band had damaged the tree, the client had recently purchased the property and had no information about the existence of support systems from the previous owner.

Another form of support is bracing. For example, when the heavy, wet snow that covered your prize maple tree finally melts, and you find that a primary limb is split lengthwise from the weight of the snow, duct tape is NOT the answer! Instead, take a hand drill and drill a hole through the limb, top to bottom. The bit that you use should be a straight bit, not a wood type. It should be approximately one/sixth the size diameter as the limb you are working on. You should use a stainless steel bolt, two washers and nut. If the split is

longer than six inches, you may see the need for more than one bolt. Draw the split closer together until the washer starts to impress into the bark of the limb. The tree will take over from there! To tidy up the job, you can cut any portion of the bolt that extends beyond the nut. Your job is done. Leave it alone and forget about it!

#### ALTERNATIVES TO PESTICIDES

You can have a green and healthy lawn and garden without depending on large amounts of pesticides. It is better for your yard, the people and animals that use your yard, and our streams. Follow the guidelines below to decrease pesticide use.



- Grow native plants that are able to handle the climate and pests of our region. See http://www.dcnr.state.pa.us/forestry/plants/nativeplants/ for more information on native plants, including where to buy them.
- Spread mulch at the base of trees to keep mowers and weed whackers from opening up wounds in the bark. Spread mulch flat on the ground to a height of no more than two inches; do not smother the tree's roots and bark by building a cone or "volcano" around the tree.
- Provide the proper amount of water to keep your lawn and gardens stress-free. Water your lawn deeply, but only every several days and not at all if it rains. Mow your lawn to a height of 2 ½ to 3 inches.
- Get a soil test to determine if you need to use any fertilizers. Apply fertilizers only at the rate needed and never before a storm. A soil test kit can be cheaply obtained from your local Penn State Extension office (610-696-3500).
- When weeds sprout, hand dig or spot treat them with herbicides.
- Rotate your garden crops, just as farmers do. Do not plant tomatoes or peppers in the same place each year. Consider scattering species throughout your garden. If a tomato hornworm finds one of your tomato plants, for instance, it may easily move to all of your tomato plants if they are next to each other.
- If you find a pest damaging one of your plants, consider the following questions before deciding what approach to take.
  - 1. What is it? If you don't know, Penn State Extension's website, http://extension.psu.edu/pests/ipm, is a good place to start.
  - 2. Where does the pest live, breed, and what does it eat?
  - 3. How many pests are there?
  - 4. How many pests are too many?
  - 5. If I have "too many," what is the best way to get rid of the pest?
  - 6. What are the potential "side effects" of control methods?
- When pesticides are needed, use insecticidal soaps and Bacillus thuringiensis or "Bt."



Being selective in your pesticide use and growing plants native to our region will increase the number of beneficial insects, such as butterflies and other pollinators, in your gardens.

While our two annual flower sales provide essential funding that supports the fire company's ability to continue to deliver



emergency services to the communities that we serve, these events also provide community residents an opportunity to learn more about your fire company and the services that it provides, to meet fire department personnel, to see our apparatus and equipment, and to learn more about fire prevention and other community risk reduction activities in which we partner with the community. We also look forward to seeing you at the annual Goshen Country Fair where there is something for all members of your family. As always, the Goshen Country Fair continues to be a major fundraising activity.

We appreciate the other ways in which members of our residential and business communities provide financial support through our annual subscription drive and donations. Likewise, our elected officials demonstrate their support for the essential fire, emergency medical services, and fire police services that we provide, working with our public safety partners, to ensure our readiness to provide the level and quality of services that our community expects and deserves.

For a number of years we have prepared successful grant proposals and secured grants for both our fire and emergency medical service divisions through the Office of the State Fire Commissioner's Grant Program. The grants received this year will be used to purchase additional technical rescue and emergency medical service equipment. These grants have enhanced our ability to better serve you without the need for additional local funding.

As most residents are aware, we have been planning a major renovation of our Park Avenue Station to enhance our ability to serve our community. A major component of this project will be to expand our facilities required to support overnight crews through the provision of necessary sleeping facilities. Several years ago, we utilized several state grants to add a third bunk room at our Boot Road Station. We will keep you informed as our building plans progress and how you will be able to support this important initiative.

In addition to ensuring the adequacy of our two stations to serve our community, there are other essential resource requirements. Two of these are obviously apparatus and equipment. We are pleased to report that with the addition of our new aerial apparatus and ambulances, along with the acquisition of some new equipment, we are well equipped to meet the many challenging emergency service needs of the communities that we serve. Our apparatus replacement plan that has been in place for a number of years has enabled us to make prudent apparatus funding and replacement decisions.

We recently established a capital budget committee that is charged with developing a multi-year capital budget that will correspond with the fire company's strategic plan and address capital projects such as building renovations, apparatus replacement, and major equipment purchases. This new committee along with our existing budget and finance committees is designed to ensure that we demonstrate stewardship in all financial decisions.

That brings us to the last, but without question, our most important resource requirement – people. While every contemporary organization requires dedicated individuals who work together as a team to accomplish the organization's work and achieve its mission, this is particularly true in the case of an organization that delivers mission-critical emergency services as the need for these services arises. We are a combination department in that we supplement volunteers with part-time and full-time career personnel to ensure our readiness to serve the community at all times.

As always, we call upon individuals who live or work in our community to consider serving our community by volunteering your time. We are always seeking new members to join one of our three operating divisions – fire, emergency medical services, and fire police. If an operational role is not for you there are many other opportunities to serve in support or administrative roles. #### PLEASE DON'T FLUSH THE WIPES

In recent years, the use of products such as pre-moistened "flushable" wipes has been advertised as a way to feel "cleaner" and "fresher", but most people don't know they have caused damage to wastewater systems across the country. These products' labels indicate they are safe for sewers and septic systems. In addition to wipes, there are also other cleaning products that are labeled as "flushable" which may go down the toilet, but they are not breaking down

sufficiently enough. This has led to clogged pipes and jammed pumps in sewer systems across the country. This picture shows residue wipe material that had been removed from a sewer system.

These wipes do not disintegrate like toilet paper. A number of sewer authorities across the country have been spending large amounts of money to address the problem. The Orange County, California, Sanitation District spent \$320,000 in one year on "de-ragging" maintenance calls to ten pump stations. The Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission has spent more than one million dollars on equipment to shred the wipe material. Officials with DC Water, the District's water and sewer agency, also reported more than 500 labor hours were used over the past 12 months to remove debris from clogged pipes (see photo below) and repair broken equipment and an estimated 35 percent increase in broken pumps and clogged sewer lines over the past few years. New York City is currently considering a ban on packaging that





indicates that the wipes are flushable unless the product has passed an approved third party test.

At the heart of the issues is the fact that utilities believe manufacturers of flushable products are not conducting disintegration tests for flushable wipes that mimic actual conditions in real-life sewer systems. Manufacturers don't agree with this claim and say their test results provide scientific evidence that wipes are safe for sewer and septic systems. Due to the many issues across the country as well as internationally, the definition of what is considered "flushable" and what specific testing should be conducted to determine whether a product breaks down adequately enough to be flushed or not will likely continue to garner increased interest.

The East Goshen Municipal Authority protects its pumps by installing a grinder at the pump inlet. Although we have not experienced any breakdowns, the presence of these wipe materials has resulted in increased costs related to more frequent wetwell cleaning.

If you are concerned about whether flushable products are causing and/or have caused a problem to your system, stop flushing the items in question. Instead, bag them and place them in your garbage for collection. When in doubt, not flushing is a better choice.
