




2017 BUDGET UPDATE


On December 6th, the Board of Supervisors approved the 2017 Township budget. We are proud to report that for the 14th consecutive year, the Township will have no increase to the real estate tax rate. New Due Dates for Sewer and Trash Bills

Effective for the 1st Quarter of 2017, sewer and trash/recycling bills will be due 45 days after the billing date, rather than after 90 days, as they have been for the past two and a half years. This means that the bills that are sent out in mid-January will be due in early March. We understand that this change may result in some initial confusion, and we will endeavor to make the new date as broadly known as possible over the next three months. However, it is our hope that the shorter billing period will result in fewer lost or misplaced bills and a more seamless billing process overall.


2017 REAL ESTATE TAX PAYMENTS

Please note that the 2017 Township Real Estate Tax Invoices will be mailed on February 1st. If you have an escrow account, please forward your invoice to your mortgage company and do not mail payment directly to the Township as your mortgage company will also make the payment. Every year, we receive hundreds of duplicate tax payments that need to be researched and returned to residents, at considerable time and energy for Township staff. Thanks!



New Pick-Up Dates for Trash and Recycling in 2017

Beginning January 2017, we will be changing the weekly trash and recycling pick-up dates for residents in single family homes. As shown in the map below, residents living north of Paoli Pike as well as along East Boot Road and in the Hunt Country and Clocktower Woods developments will move to Monday (trash and recycling) and Thursday (trash only), while all other residents living south of Paoli Pike will move to Tuesday (trash and recycling) and Friday (trash only). The Township changes the pick-up dates every three years. The reason for this is that the Monday-Thursday pick-up falls on three holidays every year (Memorial Day, Labor Day and Thanksgiving) when there is no trash service. Therefore, changing the dates ensures that all residents receive the same level of trash and recycling services over the long-term. At the same time, we recognize that this change may be disruptive to many residents' normal weekly routines and, as with the change in the billing date, we will continue to get the word out about the new schedule in the coming weeks.



2017 Trash Holiday Schedule

Please note that trash and recycling will not be picked up on the dates listed below. They will be taken on the next regularly scheduled service day.

January 2nd, Monday – New Year's Day May 29th, Monday – Memorial Day July 4th, Tuesday – Independence Day September 4th, Monday – Labor Day November 23rd, Thursday – Thanksgiving December 25th, Monday – Christmas

DON'T FORGET!

Trash & Recycling Days Will Switch on January 1.

Houses with pick-up on Monday-Thursday now will change to Tuesday-Friday and vice-versa.

WINTER BULK TRASH AND YARD WASTE DATES

BULK TRASH

A bulk item must be able to be picked up and handled by two people. A maximum of <u>two</u> bulk items may be placed out for pickup at one time.

- December 15th and 16th
- January 12th and 13th
- February 16th and 17th
- March 16th and 17th



YARD WASTE*

Only paper bags will be collected, <u>no plastic bags</u> will be taken. You may also use a trash can; provided it weighs no more than 50 lbs.

- December 7th and 21st
- January 11th and 25th
- February 8th and 22nd
- March 8th and 22nd

Suggested Alternatives to Salt for Treating Icy Sidewalks and Driveways

Spreading salt on roads and driveways reduces ice formation, allowing for safer travel for pedestrians and motorists. Too much salt, however, can corrode metal on cars, damage gardens and trees, and pollute our local streams. However, you can be part of the solution by using alternative products or by using salt at recommended times and rates.

There are several products that can be used instead of salt. Here are a few options to consider:

- Sand, kitty litter, and coffee grinds These products provide great traction. Sand can easily be swept up and disposed of afterwards, but kitty litter often creates mushy clumps. These products will absorb sunlight, contributing to melting.
- **Ashes** For those with a wood burning fireplace, ashes are a great option. They provide a lot of traction and absorb sunlight, so ice will melt quickly on a sunny day. And they're free!
- Beet juice Increasingly being used on its own or mixed with salt, this safe and natural product allows ice to melt even when air temperatures are extremely cold.
- Potassium acetate, calcium magnesium acetate Acetates are super-effective even at extremely low temperatures and are biodegradable. The drawback? Price. They cost several times as much as rock salt and can be difficult to find. This is a good solution for small areas in environmentally sensitive locations, such as next to a stream.
- Other "chlorides": calcium chloride, magnesium chloride, potassium chloride Salt (sodium chloride) is not the only

chloride product that can melt ice. These products are generally more expensive than rock salt, but work better at low temperatures. Calcium chloride is the preferred choice over magnesium chloride, as it works at lower temperatures and is applied at a lower rate, leading to less chloride in our streams. Potassium chloride is considered safest for pets and plants, but is often more expensive and does not work well at lower temperatures. All chloride products contribute to pollutant loads in our streams and their use should be minimized.

If salt is the only reasonable alternative for your property, remember:

- Remove as much ice and snow off the top as you can before applying salt to speed up melting
- A little salt can go a long way:
- Rock salt should be applied at about a handful per square yard
- Calcium chloride should be spread even thinner, about a handful for 3 square yards
- The air temperature matters. Rock salt is five times more effective at melting ice at 30°F than 20°F, and ineffective below 20°F. Calcium chloride is better for temperatures down to 0°F.
- Applying early can prevent ice crystals from forming and minimize the amount of salt used overall.

CAPITAL PROJECT UPDATES

East Goshen Township is proud to report that significant progress has been made on two capital projects: the Paoli Pike Trail and the playground renovation.

The **Paoli Pike Trail** is envisioned as a 2.7-mile pedestrian-bike path safely bisecting the Township along Paoli Pike from East High School to Line Road. This trail could become a centerpiece of the Township, adding value to both our homes and our quality of life. Not only would such a path promote healthier, active lifestyles, but it would also provide the type of amenity—walkability—that homebuyers increasingly look for in their housing search.

Segments of Paoli Pike Trail from Airport Road to Line Road



The Trail has been broken into seven segments (labelled A-G), at an overall anticipated expense of \$7.2 million. The Township has worked tirelessly to secure grant funding to offset project expenses. As of November 1, 2016, we are happy to report we have secured \$2,886,000 from three different grant programs, with three more pending grant applications still under consideration.

We have many Paoli Pike Trail project partners to thank, including McMahon Associates, which has spearheaded the design and engineering work; our state elected officials, who have advocated on the Trail's behalf in Harrisburg; and the many volunteer members of the Township's Authorities, Boards and Commissions who have devoted substantial amounts of time and energy to making the trail a reality. The Township is also indebted to the support that it has received from the local business community. Employees at corporations like CTDI and QVC can now envision a future in which they can walk to the Town Center for lunch, leaving their cars behind.

The **playground** in the Township Park has been in need of a renovation for quite some time. This need was formally identified in the 2014 Parks, Recreation and Open Space Plan and was more recently the focus of the 2016 Park Master Plan. When developing this renovation project, the Park Commission and I wanted to ensure that the new space was user friendly, comfortable, creative and accessible. With this in mind, I spent a great deal of time talking to the real playground users – the children who live in East Goshen! I surveyed over 600 children in East





Goshen Elementary, the Goshen Friends School and Ss. Simon and Jude and asked them questions about playground themes, equipment and simply "what they like". A special thank you goes out to our wonderful school administrators who opened their doors and let us pick



the children's brains. In the end, East Goshen children very enthusiastically wanted a playground that is "natural" in theme, and that will include both traditional and non-traditional play pieces. Parents and care takers will be happy as well; the new playground design will be shaped like a flower, with a 360 degree view of all play pieces, along with a central, shaded seating area, which will help make the playground comfortable even on the hottest summer day. The playground's "flower" petals will have play pieces grouped according to recommended age and ability – no more intermingling of 12 year olds and 2 year olds. This unique design is the product of countless meetings between the Park Commission and TCA, the author of the Park Master Plan, and I thank them both for their creative efforts.

The new destination playground has an anticipated cost

of \$715,000. As of November 1, 2016, we are pleased to announce that we've received \$225,000 through a PA Department of Community and Economic Development grant. We also have one pending grant application and should know shortly if we're successful with that.

As you can see, it is an exciting time to be living and working in East Goshen Township. Our parks are wonderful, new residents and businesses are moving in, and the Paoli Pike Trail and playground projects will underscore our successes and bolster the quality of life for all!

WINTER WEATHER AND SNOW REMOVAL

Pre-storm Preparedness Checklist:

- ✓ No on-street parking to allow efficient and safe plowing/salting
- ✓ Clear snow from any fire hydrants on or near your property
- Keep a safe distance from all plow trucks
- ✓ Avoid all unnecessary travel
- ✓ Keep your pets inside and make sure they have a seven day supply of food
- ✓ Have sufficient supplies of essential items in the event of power outages, including medications, water, non-perishable food, baby supplies, flashlights, batteries and propane for your grill.
- ✓ Have dry wood in a garage or covered for the fireplace or woodstove
- ✓ Fill up your vehicles





Snow Removal:

- We put a layer of brine on the road before the snow event starts; this prevents snow from bonding to the pavement and creating ice.
- Then we put a layer of salt down on the roads when the snow event starts.
- Once the snow starts to accumulate, the plows make at least one pass through every Township street until the snow stops.
- When the snow stops, we begin to clear the streets by pushing the snow to the curb.
- Cul-de-sacs and storm drains are the final areas to be cleaned up after a storm.

Important Information on Snow Removal:

- Do not park on the street during a snow event.
- When shoveling your driveway leave the last six feet of your driveway un-shoveled until the plowing has ceased. This un-shoveled part will allow the snow being pushed by the plow to remain on the plow and not end up in your driveway.
- When clearing your driveway, do not deposit the snow into the roadway. This can cause hazardous conditions to other motorists.
- The Township does not plow residential driveways.
- If an ambulance has been called to an address in the Township, we will help bring in the emergency vehicle.
- Please remember that we cannot be everywhere at once. We will plow all roads in order of traffic priority—main roads then secondary roads.
- Our snow plow drivers are asked to take precautions to avoid striking mailboxes with their plows but snow can be extremely heavy and a cold brittle mail box can come down easily.



Mailboxes:

- Expensive or ornate mailboxes should be replaced with a basic mailbox for the winter months
- Mailboxes should be located so the face of the box is 6 8 inches from the edge of the roadway. This is according to USPS guidelines. We suggest you put them as far as 15 inches back from the road edge.
- Is your mailbox sturdy? Plastic mailboxes tend to become brittle from the sun's UV rays. Make sure the door on the mailbox is closed tightly. If the door is missing or open the mailbox may "fold" on impact from the snow.
- The East Goshen Board of Supervisors has passed a resolution that states the Township will reimburse a resident \$25 for replacement or repair of a damaged mailbox, provided the resident has notified the Township within one week of the storm. The Township does not repair mailboxes.



What Day is Our Birthday?

"The Second Day of July 1776, will be the most memorable Epocha, in the History of America. I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated, by succeeding generations, as the great anniversary Festival. It ought to be commemorated, as the Day of Deliverance by solemn Acts of Devotion to God Almighty. It ought to be solemnized with Pomp and Parade, with Shews, Games, Sports, Guns, Bells, Bonfires and Illuminations from one End of this Continent to the other from this Time forward forever more."

-- John Adams in a letter to his wife Abigail, dated July 3, 1776

For most of us, July 2nd is just a regular summer day spent at work or the pool, its historical significance reduced to a footnote in history textbooks (or a passing reference in Township newsletters). In fact, July 2, 1776 was the date that the Second Continental Congress declared its independence from Great Britain. Two days later, that same body adopted a hand-written statement titled the "Declaration of Independence". No one even thought to celebrate our new-found independence until July 8th when Philadelphia held a parade, and, more importantly, no one even thought to tell the Continental Army—the soldiers tasked with actually defending this new country called the United States of America—until July 9th. In fact, the Declaration of Independence wasn't even signed by most delegates until August 2nd,



and one of the delegates (Thomas McKean of Delaware) waited until the following year to affix his John Hancock, presumably to hedge his bets in the event that the Revolutionary War got off to a rocky start.

Why do we celebrate our nation's birthday on the day that a piece of paper was approved rather than on the day that we actually declared independence? It's like celebrating your own birthday on the day that your mother signed the hospital discharge papers rather than on the day you were born. An astute student of history might therefore be forgiven for breaking out his flip flops, dusting off her sunglasses, icing up the cooler and firing up the grill on July 2nd, even if he or she will likely be celebrating alone.

Like the United States, East Goshen Township has its own birthday controversy. By way of a quick background, Goshen Township, encompassing what is now East Goshen, West Goshen and West Chester Borough, was incorporated in 1704. Eighty-four years later in 1788, West Chester was incorporated as a borough leaving the rump Goshen Township on its own.



However, managing a 22 square mile township with "two hundred freeholders and [i]nmates and freemen" had created challenges that couldn't be foreseen in 1704. The public record from 1817 about life in Goshen is long on hyperbole. The inhabitants of the Township were "burdened and grievously oppressed" by such inconveniences as "the difficulty of attending [T]ownship [m]eetings, serving its offices and other goods." As a result, on February 3, 1817, the Court appointed Richard Thomas, George

Massey and John Jacobs to determine whether and how Goshen Township should be divided. Four months later on June 12, 1817, Thomas, Massey and Jacobs issued their report (with "public notice given", naturally), which reflected "a general voice in favour of a division of [the] [T]ownship" and a recommendation to divide Goshen into East Goshen and West Goshen. Two months later on August 7, 1817, their report was read into the Court record and confirmed.

So, what day is East Goshen's birthday? February 3rd, when our grievances were first heard? June 12th, when the recommendation to divide was formally made? Or August 7th, when everything was entered into the public record? Fortunately, when you live in East Goshen Township, every day is a holiday, so it doesn't really matter!

In any event, 2017—our 200th birthday—is shaping up to be a watershed year. More information about our Bi-Centennial Celebrations will be forthcoming in the months ahead.





feel their sometimes silk.


You could do that in the Chester County Bookstore, but you can't anymore. It's all gone now.

Odds & Ends from Rick Smith, Township Manager

East Goshen Has Many People But None To Spare

There are two pedestrian crossings at the East Goshen Park. The applicable section of the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code reads as follows.

- § 3542. Right-of-way of pedestrians in crosswalks.
 - (a) General rule.--When traffic-control signals are not in place or not in operation, the driver of a vehicle shall yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection.
 - **(b) Exercise of care by pedestrian.--**No pedestrian shall suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle, which is so close as to constitute a hazard.
 - **(c) Limitation on vehicles passing.--**Whenever any vehicle is stopped at any crosswalk at an intersection or at any marked crosswalk to permit a pedestrian to cross the roadway, the driver of any other vehicle approaching from the rear shall not overtake and pass the stopped vehicle.
 - **(d) Application of section.--**Subsection (a) does not apply under the conditions stated in section 3543(b) (relating to pedestrians crossing at other than crosswalks).
 - **(e) Penalties.-**-The driver of a vehicle who violates subsection (a) commits a summary offense and shall, upon conviction, be sentenced to pay a fine of \$50.

GOSHEN FIRE COMPANY UPDATE

As always, the members of the Goshen Fire Company are eager to serve our community and to share with you some of the many ways we do so throughout the year. This seems appropriate as we approach the end of another year in which we continue to partner with those that we serve and with our elected and appointed officials and other stakeholders to effectively, efficiently, and safely deliver essential public safety services tailored to the specific needs of the community that we serve.



While the primary emergency services delivered by our three operating divisions are highly visible and include the services provided by our Fire, Emergency Medical Services, and Fire Police Divisions, we wanted to take time in this update to acquaint you with some other ways in which we serve the residents of East Goshen Township throughout the year.

In addition to responding to fire, rescue, and hazardous materials incidents, our Fire Division engages in essential preparation activities, including classroom and hands-on training throughout the year. In addition to participating in a comprehensive station training program, members of the division attend training courses and certification programs at regional fire training academies and national conferences. The division also develops pre-incident plans of target hazards within our fire district. Throughout the year personnel deliver many public education programs, including those presented at local schools and our annual fire prevention open house held at the Park Avenue station.

When they are not responding to emergency incidents involving medical emergencies or traumatic injuries, our Emergency Medical Services Division members engage in a rigorous continuing education program designed to maintain their required certifications and to advance their knowledge and skills to enable them to serve the emergency medical services needs of our community more fully. This division routinely serves our community through standing by at community events, such as those sponsored by East Goshen Township and at numerous school sporting and other activities. It also conducts community education programs.

Our Fire Police Division supports our other two operating divisions and local law enforcement agencies by ensuring emergency incident scene safety through their traffic control and other activities designed to properly secure a scene and protect our community's emergency responders. The members of this division are engaged in an aggressive training initiative that will lead to being recognized through new levels of state certification that will become available in the near future. Our fire police cadre is unique in that it is the largest fire police unit within Chester County and the region. Representative activities of the active community service schedule of our fire police include involvement in the East Goshen Township Pumpkin Fest, Community Day and Fireworks, and Artisans Day at the Blacksmith Shop.

Our three operating divisions are supported by the work of those who serve in administrative capacities, including on our Board of Directors, Relief Association, Fair Corporation, and Auxiliary. Their labors are instrumental to the success of the annual Goshen Country Fair and our Easter and Mother's Day Flower Sales.

While this update highlights our respective organizational units, the real key to our success is based on the synergies between our operating units both in their preparation to respond to emergency incidents and as they coordinate their operations on incident scenes. We trust that you will recognize the dedication and commitment that our volunteers, supplemented by paid staff, bring to fulfilling our mission of community service in a manner that fully meets and, ideally, exceeds the expectations of those that we serve. We consider serving our community a responsibility that we are passionate about fulfilling.

We likewise trust that you will consider how you could use your time and talents to join us in community service. Information on becoming a member of our organization can be found on our website. We also encourage you to stop by our Park Avenue station any Monday evening to learn more about your fire company and how you might join us in serving our great community.

In closing, we would remind you of these important things that you can do to protect your family and home from fire during the coming winter months:

- Change your smoke detector batteries.
- Check your fire extinguishers.
- Have your home heating system checked and serviced.
- Have your fireplace checked, and use it safely.
- Exercise caution when using portable heaters.
