DEA has scheduled another National Prescription Drug Take Back Day on **Saturday**, **October 29**, **2011**, **from 10:00 am - 2:00 pm**. to provide a venue for persons who want to dispose of unwanted and unused prescription drugs. Please check back in mid-September to find convenient collection locations in your zip code area, county, city, or state.

Law enforcement agencies that wish to host a collection site should call the Point of Contact for your area.

National Prescription Drug Take Back Day addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. More than seven million Americans currently abuse prescription drugs, according to the 2009 Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's National Survey on Drug Use and Health. Each day, approximately, 2,500 teens use prescription drugs to get high for the first time according to the Partnership for a Drug Free America. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including the home medicine cabinet.

DEA in conjunction with state and local law enforcement agencies throughout the United States conducted National Prescription Drug Take Back Days on Saturday, September 25, 2010 and April 25, 2011. Nearly, 4,000 state and local law enforcement agencies throughout the nation participated in these events, collecting more than 309 tons of pills.


Four days after last fall's Take-Back Day, Congress passed legislation amending the Controlled Substances Act to allow the DEA to develop a process for people to safely dispose of their prescription drugs. DEA immediately began developing this process after President Obama signed the Safe and Secure Drug Disposal Act of 2010 on October 12. Until that process is complete, however, DEA will continue to hold Take Back Days every six months.

BACKGROUND:

WHEREAS, on or about July 7, 2011, the Township solicited requests for proposals ("RFP") for consulting and actuarial services for the East Goshen Township Non-Uniformed Defined Contribution Pension Plan (the "Plan") pursuant to certain Specifications for Actuarial and Consulting Services dated July 7, 2011 (the "Specifications"); and

WHEREAS, Consultant submitted a Proposal dated July 12, 2011 (the "Proposal") in accordance with the RFP; and

WJEREAS, in Resolution No. 2010-61 the Board of Supervisors of East Goshen Township (the "Board") established the East Goshen Township Pension Committee (the "Committee") and delegated to such Committee the authority to retain on behalf of the Township professional consultants to administer the Plan; and

WHEREAS, at a public meeting held on August 3, 2011, the Committee awarded the bid to Consultant; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to set forth the terms pursuant to which Consultant will perform the work specified in the RFP, Specifications and Proposal;

NOW THEREFORE, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Incorporation of Recitals</u>. The recitals set forth in the Background section of this Agreement are incorporated herein as if set forth herein in their entirety.
- 2. <u>Description of Work to Be Performed by Consultant.</u> In accordance with the RFP, Specifications and Proposal, copies of which are attached hereto collectively as <u>Exhibit "A"</u> and which are incorporated herein by reference, Consultant shall complete the following work (the "Work"):
 - (a) Provide Act 205 actuarial services.
 - (b) Prepare annual financial statements pursuant to GASB 25 & 27.
 - (c) Prepare the Act 205 Actuarial Valuation Reports (Form PC-210C, PC-203C, and PC-203A) as required by Act 205 for submission to the Pennsylvania Employee Retirement Commission.
 - (d) Prepare State Certification and Ad-Hoc Post-Retirement Adjustment Certification Forms (Form AG-385). Provide to Township by March 1st of each year.
 - (e) Prepare the Minimum Municipal Obligation as required by Act 205 to be submitted by the Chief Administrative Officer to the governing body by September 30th of each year. Provide to Township by September 1st of each year.
 - (f) Maintain a list of all active, retired, and terminated vested members including their date of entry into the Plan, annual wages, members' contributions, accumulated contributions, pension benefits, and separation date.
 - (g) Update Township on any changing legislation and regulations that are relevant to the administration of the Plan.

- (h) Prepare year end individual benefit statements including the allocation of investment income, municipal contribution, realized and unrealized gains or losses, and expenses incurred for the Plan.
- 3. <u>Term of Agreement.</u> The term of this Agreement shall commence on the date of execution of this Agreement by both parties and shall expire on December 31, 2013. The Agreement shall automatically renew for successive one year terms unless either party sends written notice to terminate the Agreement at least thirty days prior to December 31, 2013. The fees that Consultant shall be paid in any renewal term shall be specifically approved in writing between the parties.
- 4. **Fee Schedule.** The Township shall pay Consultant fees for the services that Consultant performs pursuant to this Agreement in accordance with the fee schedule which is attached hereto as <a href="Exhibit "B". The Township shall pay Consultant the enumerated fees as the Work is performed after receipt of an invoice from Consultant and approval by the Committee. The invoice shall itemize the Work completed to date and shall be paid within thirty (30) days of receipt of same from funds in the Plan.

If Consultant is requested to perform any additional work not specified in paragraph 2 above, it shall perform such work for the Township and bill the Township based on the hourly rate set forth on the Fee Schedule.

5. <u>Dispute Resolution</u>. Upon mutual consent of the parties, disputes which arise pursuant to this Agreement or the Work performed pursuant to this Agreement may be submitted to mediation or arbitration in a forum mutually agreeable to both parties. Otherwise, all claims or disputes arising under this Agreement or the

Work performed pursuant to this Agreement shall be litigated in the Court of Common Pleas of Chester County.

6. **Termination**.

A. If the Township fails to make payments to Consultant in accordance with this Agreement, such failure shall be cause for termination or at Consultant's option, suspension of performance of the Work required under this Agreement. Consultant shall give the Township not less than thirty (30) days written notice and opportunity to cure before terminating this Agreement or suspending Work performed hereunder.

- B. The Township may terminate this Agreement upon not less than thirty (30) days written notice to Consultant with or without cause provided that Consultant shall be compensated by the Township for services performed prior to termination.
- 7. **Insurance.** Upon execution of this Agreement, Consultant must provide a certificate of insurance to the Township for professional liability in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000 per claim and annual aggregate. If the professional liability policy is written on a claims-made basis, Consultant shall maintain such insurance for three (3) years after completion of its services.

8. Miscellaneous Provisions.

A. <u>Governing Law.</u> This Agreement shall be governed by, and construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, without regard to conflict of laws principles.

B. <u>Notices.</u> All notices, requests and other communications under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be addressed as follows:

Such notices shall deemed to have been given on the date received, if hand delivered, or the next business day following deposit of the notice with an overnight delivery service, or three days after mailing, if sent by certified mail, or on the date received, if sent by fax. Notices may be given to and by counsel for each party.

- C. <u>Assignment; Benefit.</u> This Agreement is personal in its nature, and the parties shall not, without the written consent of the other, assign or transfer this Agreement or any rights or obligations hereunder.
- D. <u>Entire Agreement.</u> This Agreement, together with the RFP and Bid, contains the entire agreement between the parties hereto with respect to the

subject matter hereof and supersedes all prior agreements or understandings between the parties hereto with respect thereto.

E. <u>Amendments and Waivers.</u> No modification or amendment of any provision of this Agreement shall be effective unless it is in writing and signed by the parties hereto.

F. <u>Counterparts.</u> This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, and each such counterpart hereof shall be deemed to be an original instrument, but all such counterparts together shall constitute but one Agreement.

SITE OVERVIEW

The site is an active retail gasoline facility and A-Plus convenience store.

SITE HISTORY

- In July of 1989, Sunoco retained Groundwater and Environmental Services, Inc. (GES) to conduct a hydrogeologic investigation upon the acquisition of the Site. GES installed 4 monitoring wells along with collecting soil samples and an initial groundwater sampling event. Analytical results indicated the presence of total BTEX and total petroleum hydrocarbons (TPH) in the two samples that were located nearest the underground storage tank (UST) field.
- In the fall of 1989, Sunoco upgraded the UST system onsite. Upgrade activities included: the removal of four 4,000 gallon steel USTs which were replaced with three 10,000 gallon fiberglass USTs and the removal of two 550 gallon heating and waste oil tanks that were replaced with two 275 gallon aboveground storage tanks (ASTs).
- In December 1992 and January 1993, Sunoco completed service station upgrades, which included the abandonment of the on-site water supply well.
- In January 1995, the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Resources (PADER) **\langle** issued a letter in which no further investigative activities were deemed necessary. Subsequently, all monitoring wells were abandoned by B. L. Myers on January 27, 1995.
- In October 2006, Sunoco upgraded the dispensers and product piping at the Site. During 0 upgrade activities contamination was detected beneath one of the dispensers and was confirmed through a grab soil sample. Benzene was detected above Pennsylvania



- Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP) statewide health standard (SHS) and a notice of release (NOR) was submitted to the PADEP by EAI on October 16, 2006.
- On January 17th and 18th, 2007, EAI conducted soil borings and the installation of four monitoring wells. The monitoring wells were sampled on February 6th and April 25th, 2007.
- ♦ In August 2007, EAI submitted a Site Characterization Report (SCR) to the PADEP. The SCR was disapproved based on further site characterization being needed.
- ♦ On September 19th and 20th, 2007, EAI installed an additional four monitoring wells to help further delineate any potential migration of contaminants of concern.
- ♦ In accordance with a letter from the PADEP dated March 3, 2008 EAI conducted an extensive well search, in which no drinking wells were identified between the Site and the closest down-gradient sensitive receptor, Ridley Creek.
- On September 3, 2008, EAI installed two offsite monitoring wells and one onsite monitoring well. The offsite wells (MW-9 and MW-10) were installed for further horizontal delineation of potential contaminants of concern. The onsite well (MW-7B) was installed for vertical delineation of potential contaminants of concern.
- In December 2008, a slug test was performed on monitoring well MW-7B to calculate the hydraulic conductivity of the bedrock aquifer beneath the site.
- On May 27th and 28th, 2009 EAI installed three offsite deep monitoring wells (MW-9B, MW-10B, and MW-11B) and two onsite deep monitoring wells (MW-2B and MW-8B).
- ♦ On November 3rd through 5th, 2009 EAI installed three offsite monitoring wells (MW-12 through 14) and four offsite deep monitoring wells (MW-5B, MW-12B, MW-13B, and MW-14B).
- On November 9, 2009, Alliance submitted a Status Report for Site Characterization to the PADEP.
- ♦ On February 1, 2010, Alliance submitted a Site Characterization Report (SCR) to the PADEP selecting the Site Specific Standard (SSS) as the clean up standard for the site. The SCR was approved by the PADEP in a letter dated April 21, 2010.
- On June 10, 2010, Alliance submitted a Remedial Action Plan (RAP) to the PADEP in which a groundwater pump and treat remediation system was selected as the remedial strategy for the site. The RAP was approved by the PADEP in a letter dated July 21, 2010.
- Start up/shake down procedures for the groundwater remediation system were initiated on June 15, 2010. The permanent operation date for the groundwater remediation system is June 28, 2010.

one-half mile radius to the east of the site.

SITE ACTIVITIES THIS REPORTING PERIOD

- Liquid-level data and groundwater quality samples were collected from thirteen shallow monitoring wells (MW-1 through MW-5 and MW-7 through MW-14) and nine deep monitoring wells (MW-2B, MW-5B, MW-7B through MW-14B) on January 6 and 7, 2011. A map depicting groundwater elevation and analytical data for the shallow (overburden) and deep (shallow bedrock) monitoring wells are included as Figures 1 and 2, respectively. Note the groundwater recovery system was restarted on January 6th, prior to collection of liquid levels and groundwater samples.
- Historical groundwater elevation and analytical data is summarized in Table 1. A copy of the laboratory results is included in Appendix A.



- System operations and maintenance (O&M) visits were performed throughout the reporting period when the system was operational. Historical dissolved-phase hydrocarbon recovery data is summarized in Table 2. Groundwater system performance graphs are included as Appendix B.
- System sampling was conducted in accordance with the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit for the Site. The system sampling analytical data is summarized in Table 3. Laboratory analytical reports from the system sampling are included as Appendix C.
