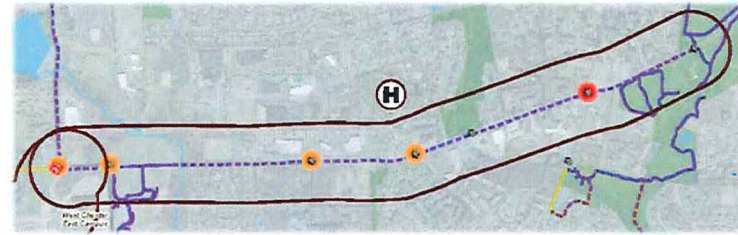

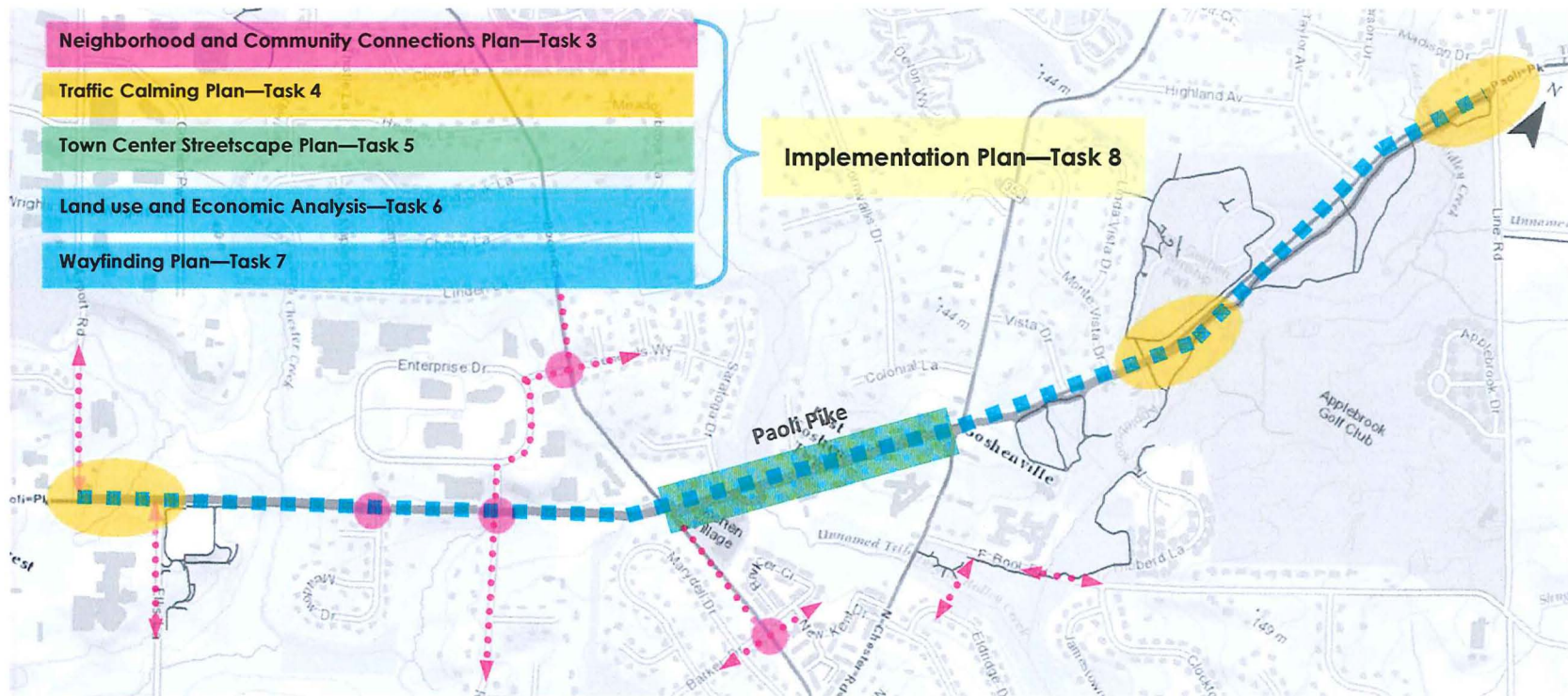

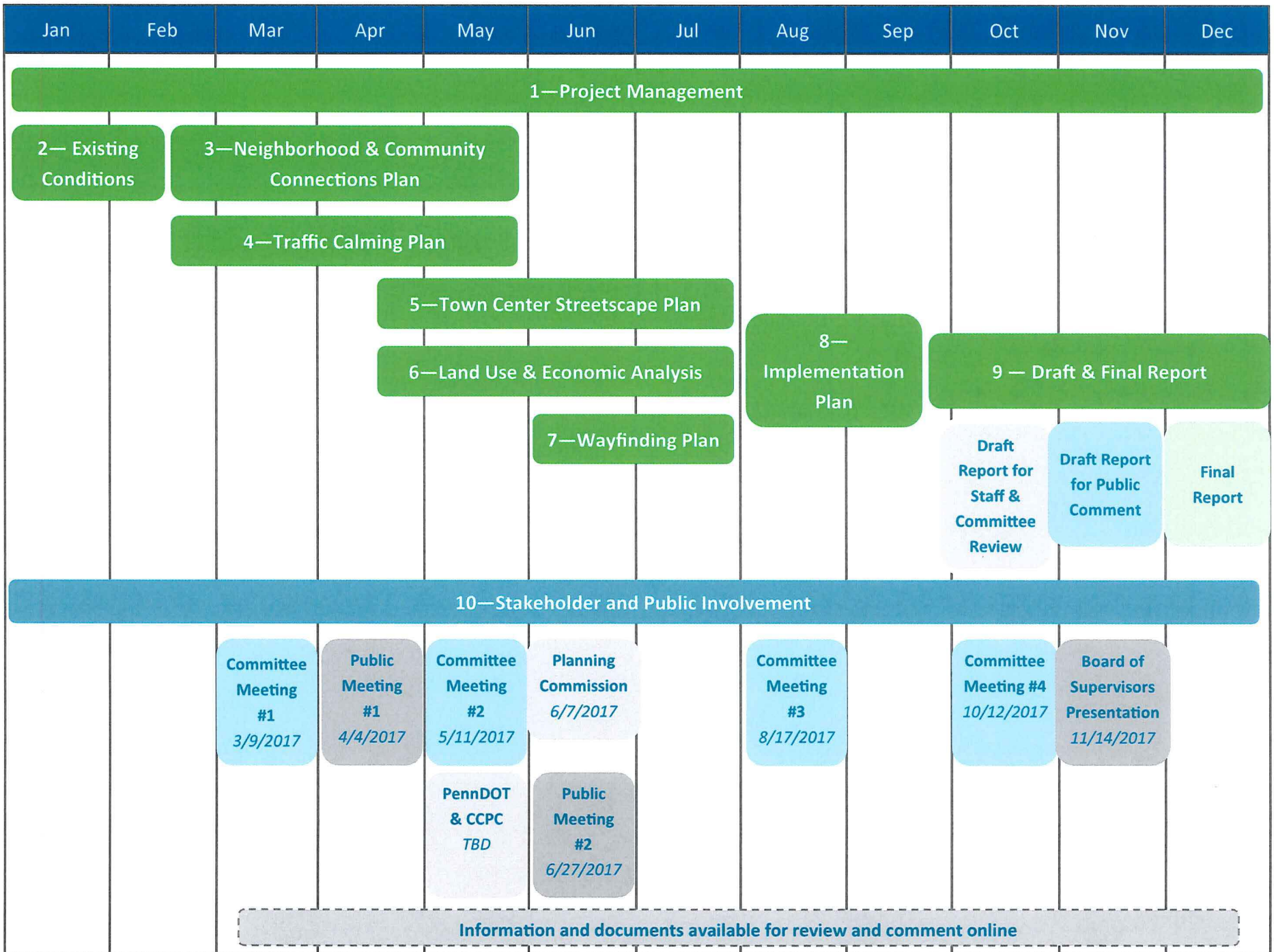

The East Goshen Township Milltown Dam Park Open Space Master Site Plan has identified a number of funding sources for the renovation project, including the DCNR Community Conservation Partnerships Program (C2P2). The Phase I Milltown Dam Renovation Project cost estimate is \$963,771 (see attached Cost Estimate provided by Simon Collins Landscape Architecture. The C2P2 Development Grant request is for \$500,000, with an East Goshen Township's matching fund expenditure of \$463,771. Attached is the DCNR-C2P2 Resolution Page for inclusion in the application packet due April 12, 2017.

Re: King Road and Sproul/North Chester Road Intersection Project

On Tuesday 3/21/17 I met with representatives from East Whiteland Township regarding the King Road and Sproul/North Chester Road Intersection.

In 2004 both Townships engaged McMahon Associates to undertake a feasibility study to determine what could be done to improve the intersection. The McMahon study indicated that it would be possible to improve the intersection by adding left turn lanes and upgrading the traffic signal. The estimated cost in 2005 was \$1.3 million. We were unable to secure any funding so the project did not move forward.

East Whiteland would like to revisit the project.

I have asked McMahon for a cost estimate to update the 2005 Study.

I would suggest that we have the 2005 Study updated. The Board would then be in a position to decide if it wanted to move forward with this project, look for funding etc.

Re: Township Building Improvements

Entrance doors – We need to replace the main entrance doors at the Township Building. The new doors must comply with ADA standards, which will require the installation of a push button operator for disabled persons. Given the closeness of the two sets of doors, this would result in both sets of door being open at the same time. The proposed solution is to relocate the outer set of door to the front of the building. This would allow both sets of door to act independently of each other and minimize the heat and or cooling loss.

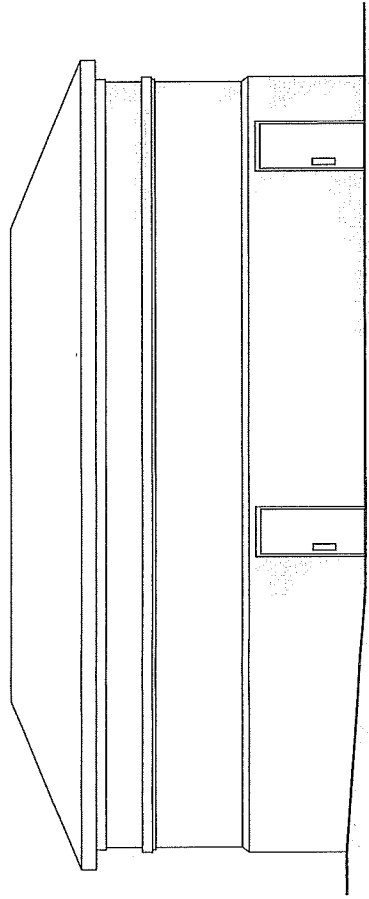
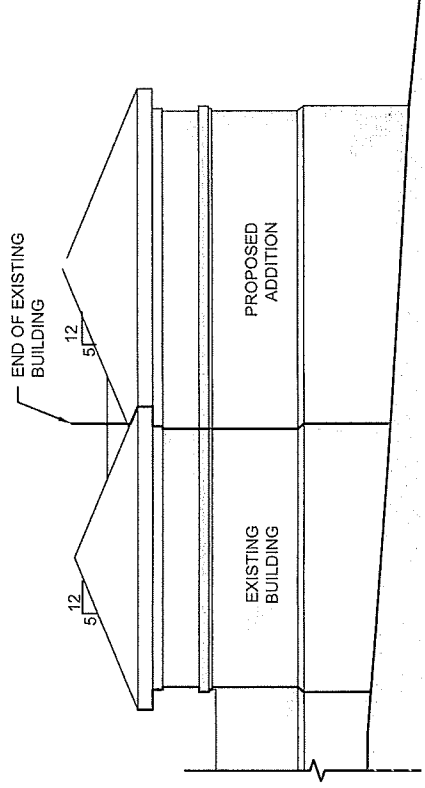
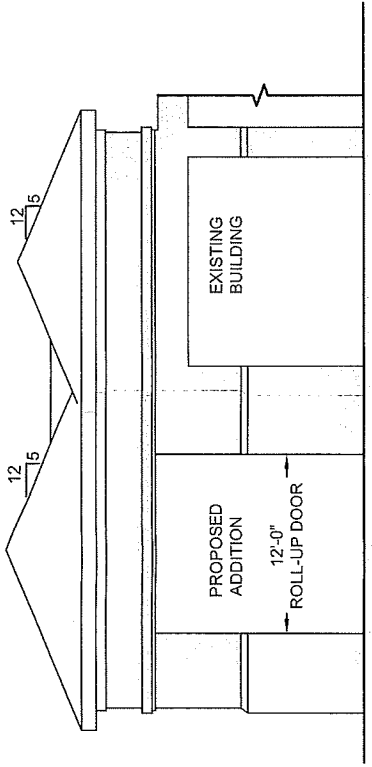
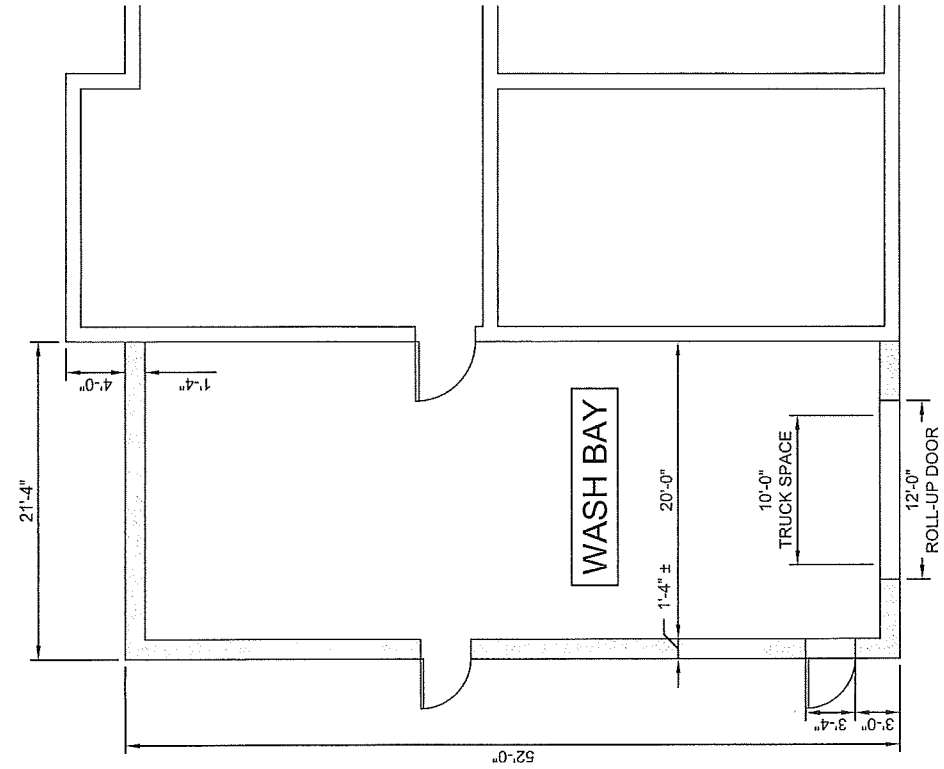

DRAFT MINUTES**

Present: Chairman Marty Shane, Vice Chairman Carmen Battavio, Supervisors Janet Emanuel, Township Manager Rick Smith, Township CFO Jon Altshul, ABC Member Erich Meyer (Conservancy Board) and Thom Clapper (Vacancy Board).

Call to order & Pledge of Allegiance:

Marty called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm and asked Thom Clapper to lead the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Moment of Silence:

Carmen called for a moment of silence to honor the troops who defend of our Nation and to those who have given the ultimate – their lives.

Recording of Meeting: *Leo Sinclair, 217 North Lochwood Lane*, indicated that he would be recording the meeting.

Chairman’s Report:

- a. Marty commented that the Board met in executive session prior to tonight’s meeting to discuss a personnel matter (ABC Interview).
- b. Marty reviewed the Board of Supervisors interviewing process that would be taking place at the meeting, noting that candidates Linda Verno and Henry Sciortino had withdrawn their applications. Marty commented that it is the Boards hope that whoever is chosen will fill out the balance of the current term and run for re-election to complete a full term. Marty also stated that candidate Richard McIntyre would be interviewed via Skype for the entire assembly to witness.

New Business:

- a. **Interview applicants for the vacancy on the Board of Supervisors and possibly appoint a new Supervisor:** Candidates Michael Lynch and Erich Meyer drew numbers from a basket, and Richard McIntyre (via Skype) was given the remaining number.

Candidate #1 (Richard McIntyre): Mr. McIntyre thanked the Board for their understanding and the opportunity to interview via Skype, and explained that for family reasons the need to interview via Skype.

1. **Have you been an East Goshen resident for at least 12 months?** Yes, I have lived in East Goshen for the past 27 years.
2. **Why do you wish to become a Supervisor?** I now have the time and would like to give back to my community.

- 1 **3. What is your understanding of the role and responsibilities of a Township**
2 **Supervisor?** The Supervisors represent the residents and businesses of the Township.
3 They are the voice for the people and act as the governing body to make fair decisions for
4 all the citizens of the Township.
5
- 6 **4. Can you make a time commitment of at least 20-25 hours/month for meetings and**
7 **preparation?** I understand the time commitment to be 20-25 hours per month. I am
8 newly retired. I serve on my Church Board, which meets the third Tuesday of each
9 month, and I am not sure how to reconcile this commitment with the Board of
10 Supervisors meeting dates.
11 *(Marty explained that the duties and time commitment, in reality, is more than 25 hours a*
12 *month, and at times can be doubled, and that the commitment of time is mostly in the*
13 *evenings).*
14
- 15 **5. What do you find the strengths of the Board of Supervisors to be?** The Board has
16 built and sustained a community where people want to live and work. The Board is
17 doing the right things for its residents.
18
- 19 **6. What are the positives about East Goshen and what areas need to be addressed?**
20 The positives of the Township are the strong services to the residents such as snow
21 removal, zoning, low taxes, and a great park system. I do not see any pressing item that
22 needs to be changed.
23
- 24 **7. If you are appointed as a Supervisor what attributes would you bring to the Board**
25 **to fulfill your role?** I have established a long standing, stable work career at the highest
26 levels of management at SMS and Siemens. I have much business experience that would
27 make itself useful as a Supervisor. I am a creative thinker, a problem solver, and I have
28 experience in the leadership of a non-profit.
29
- 30 **8. Have you served in any capacity in local government, either in East Goshen or some**
31 **other community? Explain your duties and any leadership roles you may have**
32 **obtained?** I have never served in local government. I have a lot of non-profit work,
33 having served on many committees and have non-profit Board exposure. I understand
34 the procurement process, and I have dealt with a lot of public servants.
35
- 36 **9. What leadership roles have you served in business or other outside activities?** I have
37 extensive leadership experience through my professional career at SMS. I lead many
38 new product development teams and built many new business areas at SMS. I have
39 served as Chairperson for a large non-profit concern.
40
- 41 **10. What experience do you have in managing a business budget process?** I have
42 extensive budget work in my employment at SMS. I have served as Treasurer of two
43 non-profits, gaining approval of budgeting processes.
44
- 45 **11. What experiences, do you have in working with Land Use, Subdivisions or Zoning**
46 **matters, either in East Goshen or elsewhere?** I do not have any experience in this area.

1
2 **12. Why should the Board select you as the 5th Supervisor?** I should be chosen for
3 Supervisor because I am a strategic thinker, a business person, a problem solver and I am
4 good with people.
5

6 *Carmen* asked the following questions:

- 7 a) **Have you attended any Board or ABC Committee meetings in the past?** Yes, I have
8 attended a few Board meetings in the past.
9 b) **Have you visited the Township website?** Yes, I have visited the website from time to
10 time in the past.
11 c) **Are you registered on Constant Contact for the Township?** Yes, I am.
12 d) **Are you familiar with the Paoli Pike Trail concern?** Yes, I understand this concern
13 and was present at a Board meeting when Jason Lang presented items for funding.
14 e) **If you are not chosen as a Supervisor, would you be willing to use your skills in
15 other areas of Township leadership?** Yes, I would be willing to do that.
16

17 *Chuck* asked Richard how familiar he is with the current Dam projects in the Township. Richard
18 stated that he is a little knowledgeable of the Dam projects, but does not know about the
19 technical aspects.
20

21 *Marty* asked the following questions:

- 22 a) **Have you met with any consultants or Township staff, or been in the Township
23 building prior to this interview?** No, I have not met with any staff, but I have been in
24 the Township building in the past.
25 b) **Are you knowledgeable with the Township General Operating Fund and its
26 Operating Budget?** No I am not.
27 c) **Do you know about the Township's Funds and Budgets?** I have seen them and am
28 somewhat knowledgeable about them, but not in detail.
29 d) **Do you have knowledge of the Township Capital Fund?** No, but I do understand this
30 item in general from my non-profit work.
31

32 *Carmen* asked Richard if he recognizes the costs of Police protection and how the Police
33 Department was formed. Richard stated that he doesn't know of the magnitude of the Police
34 budget but he is familiar with how the WEGO Police Department was formed.
35

36 *Marty* asked Richard what are his strongest skills. Richard stated that he has always gravitated
37 towards finance committee work as he has a strong understanding of financial statements.
38 Richard stated that he has done a lot of strategic planning work.
39

40 *Marty* asked Richard if he understands the Township Comprehensive Plan. Richard stated that
41 he has seen it, but is not well versed in it.
42

43 *Marty* asked Richard what areas of strategic planning are necessary in the Township. Richard
44 said that he could see transportation challenges and housing demands (apartment/rentals) as two
45 areas requiring strategic planning in the future.
46

1 *Marty* asked Richard if he understood the housing makeup in the Township. Richard thought
2 that East Goshen housing was mostly made up of single family homes.

3
4 *Carmen* asked Richard what issues in East Goshen need to be addressed. Richard stated that he
5 has no real complaints with the Township at the present time. Richard feels the streets are well
6 cared for, the parks are a great asset, the taxes are low, and he is thankful to live in East Goshen
7 Township.

8
9 *Marty* asked Richard if he had any other questions for the Board. Richard stated that he did not
10 have any other questions.

11
12 **Candidate #2 (Michael Lynch):**

- 13 1. **Have you been an East Goshen resident for at least 12 months?** I am the current
14 Manager of East Bradford Township. I have previously worked for C.M. Barlow,
15 property managers for the Hershey Mill Community. I am a graduate of the University of
16 Pennsylvania and Eastern University Graduate School. I have been a resident of East
17 Goshen Township since March of 1983, living in the same home.
18
- 19 2. **Why do you wish to become a Supervisor?** I would like to give back to my community
20 and be a part of the wonderful team of Supervisors. The East Goshen Supervisors and
21 staff are an exemplary group of hard working people. I have come to know and respect
22 many of them over the years and I would love to become a part of this group.
23
- 24 3. **What is your understanding of the role and responsibilities of a Township
25 Supervisor?** The role of a Supervisor is to ensure that Township monies are used wisely
26 for all its residents, and to be transparent in working through complex issues.
27
- 28 4. **Can you make a time commitment of at least 20-25 hours/month for meetings and
29 preparation?** I have current obligations on the second Tuesday and first Thursday of
30 each month. I also serve in a temporary position on a Police Advisory Board. 2017 will
31 be my last year as East Bradford Township Manager, at which time I will move to a
32 Treasurer position and my evening commitments will dissipate. In 2018, my work
33 schedule will be less busy, and in May 2020 I will retire at the age of 69. The time
34 commitment as a Supervisor will not be an issue and I will be free of any other evening
35 business at that time.
36
- 37 5. **What do you find the strengths of the Board of Supervisors to be?** The strengths are
38 its leadership, accountability, strategic visioning, the ability to operate reserve funding
39 correctly, debt management and in having created a AAA rating for the Township.
40
- 41 6. **What are the positives about East Goshen and what areas need to be addressed?** As
42 a homeowner, I have no concerns about the local government as it has created a stable,
43 low tax base. The current land use – the mix of residential and corporate space – has
44 become a great asset. The stable property values are a positive. Other assets of the
45 Township are Applebrook Park and East Goshen Park. I do understand the current
46 challenge posed by the Police Pension and compensation issue.

- 1
2 **7. If you are appointed as a Supervisor what attributes would you bring to the Board**
3 **to fulfill your role?** My professional experiences are the foundation of my attributes. I
4 would work hard to meet the expectations of others. I am an engaging person who enjoys
5 conversation and the sharing of different opinions. I am a good communicator.
6
7 **8. Have you served in any capacity in local government, either in East Goshen or some**
8 **other community? Explain your duties and any leadership roles you may have**
9 **obtained?** (Marty thought this question had already been addressed)
10
11 **9. What leadership roles have you served in business or other outside activities?**
12 (Marty thought this question had already been addressed)
13
14 **10. What experience do you have in managing a business budget process?** (Marty
15 thought this question had already been addressed)
16
17 **11. What experiences, do you have in working with Land Use, Subdivisions or Zoning**
18 **matters, either in East Goshen or elsewhere?** (Marty thought this question had already
19 been addressed)
20
21 **12. Why should the Board select you as the 5th Supervisor?** This is my time to give back
22 to “my village”. It would be a privilege to be involved with this Board and I am very
23 comfortable in this type of environment.
24

25 *Carmen* asked Michael if he was not chosen for Supervisor, if he would be willing to use his
26 skills in another area. Michael said that he would be very willing to do so in January of 2018 as
27 he would have more flexibility in his time to volunteer.
28

29 *Marty* asked if Michael had talked to anyone at the Township about this position. Michael stated
30 that he had not.
31

32 *Marty* asked if Michael has attended any East Goshen Township Board or Committee meetings
33 in the past. Michael stated that he only attended the June 2016 Hershey Mill Dam meeting, that
34 he had commitments in his position with East Bradford Township, and that he purposely
35 remained separate out of deference to Rick Smith in his capacity as Township Manager.
36

37 *Marty* asked if Michael holds any leadership position with COG. Michael responded that he
38 does not, but that he sits on the West Chester Police Advisory Board and on a West Chester
39 University Commission.
40

41 *Carmen* asked Michael if he would feel uncomfortable in any way becoming totally involved as
42 a Supervisor, given his current position as Township Manager of East Bradford Township.
43 Michael said he does not foresee any conflicts of interest.
44

1 *Marty* asked Michael if the East Bradford Board of Supervisors is aware of his interviewing for
2 this position. Michael said that they are fully aware and are unanimously supportive of his
3 candidacy for East Goshen Supervisor.
4

5 *Carmen* asked for detail on Michael's experience with East Bradford's Police contract. Michael
6 stated that there was extensive due diligence to review options for a more robust regional Police
7 service. East Bradford ultimately looked toward West Chester for a new contract as this option
8 provided a longer (5 year) term.
9

10 Mr. Lynch concluded by thanking the Board for the opportunity to interview for the Supervisor
11 vacancy. He complimented the Board on the Township website and its use of Constant Contact
12 in keeping all residents well informed.
13

14 **Candidate #3 (Erich Meyer):**

- 15 **1. Have you been an East Goshen resident for at least 12 months?** I have been a
16 resident of East Goshen Township since 1992. I am the CEO of my own electrical and
17 landscaping companies. I have been involved with the Township for the past 6 ½ years.
18
- 19 **2. Why do you wish to become a Supervisor?** I have been regularly attending Board and
20 Committee meetings since 2010, and I would like to continue contributing to the
21 Township leadership.
22
- 23 **3. What is your understanding of the role and responsibilities of a Township
24 Supervisor?** The Board of Supervisors is the legislative body for the day to day
25 responsibilities of the township. The Supervisors oversee the budget, taxes, public safety
26 and land protection for the Township.
27
- 28 **4. Can you make a time commitment of at least 20-25 hours/month for meetings and
29 preparation?** Yes, I am very aware of the time commitment of the Board. My schedule
30 is flexible to meet all commitments; this includes consideration for my daytime
31 commitments.
32
- 33 **5. What do you find the strengths of the Board of Supervisors to be?** The strength of
34 this Board is its commitment to serve the residents and the Township as a whole.
35
- 36 **6. What are the positives about East Goshen and what areas need to be addressed?**
37 The positives of East Goshen Township are its financial stability, its public works, the
38 park, and its commitment to preserving open space. I don't see any real problems, but I
39 think communication between the Board and the ABC committees could be improved.
40
- 41 **7. If you are appointed as a Supervisor what attributes would you bring to the Board
42 to fulfill your role?** The attributes I would bring as a Supervisor would be my
43 commitment, my integrity, my efficiency, my good listening skills, and my work ethic.
44
- 45 **8. Have you served in any capacity in local government, either in East Goshen or some
46 other community? Explain your duties and any leadership roles you may have**

1 **obtained?** For the past four years, I have served on the Park & Recreation Committee. I
2 am the Vice Chair of the Conservancy Commission, as well as a Paoli Pike Corridor
3 Committee Member. I have run many Conservancy Board meetings.
4

5 **9. What leadership roles have you served in business or other outside activities?** In my
6 electrical business, I am responsible for budgeting and procurement. My landscaping
7 business is a part-time concern.
8

9 **10. What experience do you have in managing a business budget process?** (This
10 question was not asked)
11

12 **11. What experiences, do you have in working with Land Use, Subdivisions or Zoning**
13 **matters, either in East Goshen or elsewhere?** During my tenure on the Conservancy
14 Board, I have advised on land use and subdivision concerns.
15

16 **12. Why should the Board select you as the 5th Supervisor?** I have been in attendance at
17 the Board of Supervisors meeting for the past 6 ½ years, and serve on many committees.
18 There would be no lag time for me to understand the workings of the Board and for me to
19 contribute.
20

21 *Marty* asked Erich if he had any other leadership roles. Erich stated that his committee work
22 represented all of his leadership roles.
23

24 *Carmen* asked Erich if he was familiar with the Police contract issue. Erich stated that he is
25 aware of this major concern for the Township.
26

27 *Chuck* asked how Erich manages his time between his two businesses. Erich stated that his
28 electrical company is really his full-time day job. His landscaping business, which he has
29 operated since he was 14 years old, has been significantly scaled down, and is really only a part-
30 time concern.
31

32 *Janet* asked what area of the Board Erich would most like to contribute. Erich said that he is
33 open to any area of concern that needs attention.
34

35 *Marty* asked Erich to comment on his understanding of the Operating Funds. Erich commented
36 that the Board has always done a great job in maintaining funds, and making major contributions
37 to the Police Pension.
38

39 *Marty* asked Erich to comment on his particular area of interest on the Board. Erich stated that
40 he would look forward to learning about all of the day to day functions of the Board, and having
41 the ability to contribute. Erich said that he would be very interested in focusing on the Public
42 Works facet of the Township.
43

44 *Marty* asked Erich if he talked to any Township employee or Board member in advance of this
45 interviewing process. Erich stated that he did not.
46

1 **Public Comment:**

2 *Joe Buonanno, 1606 Herron Lane*, asked the Board if they saw a conflict of interest in the
3 candidacy of Michael Lynch, given his current status as Township Manager for East Bradford
4 Township, especially as it relates to future grant applications. Marty said there is always
5 potential for a conflict of interest in any situation, that he has every expectation that if a conflict
6 of interest were to arise, he would expect Mr. Lynch to recuse himself from the situation.
7 Carmen commented that most all of the grant monies have already been applied for and he does
8 not see a potential problem. Rick further commented that the Board has very little input in any
9 of the grant applications.

10
11 *(The Board Took a Short Recess)*

12
13 Marty thanked all the candidates for interviewing, noting that each of the candidates have very
14 diverse backgrounds. Marty commented that Mr. McIntyre has some very useful business
15 experience, but not much direct Township experience. Mr. Lynch and Mr. Meyer have more
16 direct Township experience. Carmen mirrored Marty's sentiments and added that the Board
17 needs to choose the candidate that they feel will best serve the residents. Carmen concluded that
18 it is his hope that the two candidates who are not chosen will become involved in Township
19 affairs in the future.

20
21 Carmen motioned to appoint Michael Lynch as Supervisor, to finish Senya's term and run for re-
22 election for full term in the upcoming election. Janet seconded. Marty added the Board needed
23 to choose the candidate who would be the best fit, and that this was a very difficult decision, but
24 that Michael, given his broad based background in Township leadership, is the best fit. The
25 Board voted unanimously in favor of the motion (4/0).

26
27 Rick commented that the swearing in ceremony would take place at the February 7, 2017 Board
28 meeting.

29
30 **Adjournment:**

31 There being no further business, Janet motioned to adjourn the meeting at 8:50 pm. Carmen
32 seconded. The Board voted unanimously to adjourn.

Call to Order & Pledge of Allegiance

Marty called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and asked Chief Brenda Bernot to lead the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Moment of Silence

Carmen called for a moment of silence to honor the troops who defend our Nation and for those that have given the ultimate – their lives.

Recording

Marty asked if anyone would be recording the meeting. There was no response.

Emergency Services Report

WEGO – Chief Brenda Bernot reported that the Felony Lane Gang is back. This is a nationally organized group that steals identities. They break into cars and take anything with your ID on it and use it right away.

She also reported that people in Westtown are receiving in their mailbox what appears to be a traffic violation notice, which looks like it is from the local police department. This is a scam. Notify police if you get one. So far 200 have been dropped off in Pleasant Grove.

Chairman's Report/Announcements

1. Marty announced that the Board of Supervisors met prior to this meeting in Executive Session for a legal matter.
2. Marty announced that there will be a meeting on Tuesday, March 21, 2017 at 7 pm at Fugett Middle School at which Sunoco Logistics will make a presentation on what Township residents can expect during the Pennsylvania Pipeline Project.
3. Marty announced that the draft plan for the Milltown Dam will be presented on Wednesday, March 22, 2017. The draft plan for the Hershey Mill Dam will be presented on Thursday, March 23, 2017. Both meetings will begin at 7 pm at the Township building and will include the full plan and cost.
4. Marty announced that Karin Morris, Associate Director of Planning of the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission, will make a presentation on Aging. This will be held on Tuesday March 28, 2017 at 7 pm at the Township Building. Marty has seen this presentation and feels it is very good. Marty added that at 6:30 pm before this presentation on March 28th he has asked the Chairmen of the ABC's to meet with him.

1 5. Jon announced that at their meeting on April 4, 2017, the Board of Supervisors
2 will consider a resolution to change the sewer rates. Given the timing for the water
3 meter readings, the new sewer rates will not be calculated at the time the agenda is
4 posted on Friday, March 31st; however, the proposed rates will be available at the
5 meeting on April 4, 2017.

6
7 **Financial Report for February 2017**

8 Net of pass-through accounts, as of February 28th, the General Fund had revenues of
9 \$1,852,103 and expenses of \$1,578,241 for a year-to-date surplus of \$273,863.

10 Compared to the YTD budget, revenues were \$105,764 over budget and expenses
11 were \$213,391 under budget for a favorable budget variance of \$319,156. He added
12 that Public Works is substantially under-budget due to the relatively mild winter.

13
14 **Any Other Matter**

15 1. Rick explained that it was staff's recommendation that the Township apply for
16 two DCNR grants (C2P2 and Riparian Buffer) for the proposed improvements above
17 Milltown Dam in the upcoming cycle, which have an April 12th deadline. Rick added
18 that the proposed improvements above Hershey's Mill Dam would probably be less
19 appropriate for DCNR funding at this time. Carmen made a motion to authorize staff
20 to apply for these grants in the upcoming grant cycle. Chuck seconded the motion.
21 The motion passed unanimously.

24 Mike moved to approve the March 7, 2017 minutes. Chuck seconded the motion.

9 **Present:** Chairman Marty Shane; Vice Chairman Carmen Battavio; Supervisors Charles
10 (Chuck) Proctor, Janet Emanuel, and Michael Lynch; and Township Manager Rick Smith.
11 Representatives from Sunoco Logistics: Joseph F. McGinn, Senior Manager Public Affairs;
12 and Matthew Gordon, Principal Engineer.
13

14 **Call to Order & Pledge of Allegiance**

15 Marty called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and led the assembly in the Pledge of
16 Allegiance.
17

18 **Moment of Silence**

19 Carmen called for a moment of silence to honor the troops who defend our nation and for
20 those who have given the ultimate – their lives.
21

22 **Chairman's Report/Announcements**

- 23 1. Marty announced that the purpose of this public meeting is so East Goshen residents
24 will know what to expect from this pipeline installation project and ask questions of
25 Sunoco.
26 2. Marty outlined the format of the meeting. Sunoco representatives will have 30 minutes
27 to make their presentation. Then Board of Supervisors will ask their questions. When they
28 are done, East Goshen residents will ask their questions, followed by the general public. He
29 asked that those with questions form a line of 5 people at a time and clearly state their
30 name, address, and township.
31

32 **Sunoco Logistics Presentation**

33 Joe McGinn and Matt Gordon introduced themselves. Joe mentioned that they previously
34 had 3 meetings with the Board of Supervisors that went very well. He thanked the
35 Supervisors for arranging this public meeting.
36

37 He explained the process of the construction of the pipeline. Sunoco received their DEP
38 permits in February and construction is underway in PA. There will be two pipelines, a 20"
39 and a 16", which will be installed sequentially. The 20" pipe should be complete in the 3rd
40 quarter of 2017. The 16" pipe will be complete in late 2018. He reviewed the route of the
41 pipelines in East Goshen. It will start at Boot Road and Greenhill Road, follow Boot Road to
42 North Chester Road (Rte. 352), then continue south and cross over West Chester Pike into
43 Westtown Township.
44

45 Joe explained that there are two methods for pipeline installation – Open Cut and
46 Horizontal Directional Drilling (HDD).

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During the Open Cut method, a ditch is dug, the pipe is placed in the ditch, and the ditch is then backfilled. The HDD method involves the use of a machine that drills a hole for the pipe through the bedrock. After the hole is drilled, the machine pulls back the pipe. The ends of the pipes are then connected using the Open Cut method. Much of the pipe in East Goshen will be installed by the HDD method. The minimum depth for the pipeline is 4 feet, although the HDD pipe will be much deeper than that. He showed a plan that depicted the entry and exit points of the drilling. Sunoco work hours during construction will be 7am to 10pm, seven days per week.

Joe introduced Matt Gordon who is the overall Project Manager. Matt explained the three (3) phases of construction:

<u>Preparation</u>	<u>Mobilization & Activation</u>	<u>Restoration</u>
* Surveying	* Equipment & setup	* Landscape renovation
* Tree Clearing	* Construction	* Road renovation
* Grading, leveling & matting	* Environmental inspection	* Right-of-way marker placement

Matt explained that surveyors will clearly mark the construction area and signs will be used to define those areas. He explained how the HDD drill is turned underground. A storage tank will be on site that will contain the drilling fluid (bentonite clay and water) which is used to cool the drill head. The used drilling fluid will be disposed of at a sewage treatment facility and the solids are disposed at a landfill. The drilling machine will pull the pipe through the hole. All welds will be x-rayed and the pipeline will be hydro tested twice before it is placed in service.

The DEP permits have many special conditions. Sunoco is required to have a Water Supply Plan, Inadvertent Return Plan, Void Mitigation Plan, and Prevention, Preparedness and Contingency Plan. Water will not be taken from the local supply. PA DEP requires that Sunoco test or pay for the testing of private wells within 150 feet of the pipelines. Sunoco is responsible if they cause any damage to landowners' property.

There are FAQs on their website and their hotline is open 24/7. They are hoping to start next week. They don't expect to close any roads.

Marty thanked them for their presentation. He mentioned that Grant Everhart, Chief of Goshen Fire Company, is here to explain how they will be ready to handle an emergency.

He also mentioned that Carol Stauffer, AICP, from the Chester County Planning Commission, was here as well and encouraged those in attendance to visit that CCPC website for pipeline information.

1 Joe suggested calling the Sunoco hotline (1-855-430-4491) for general inquiries and noted
2 the Sunoco website has an email inquiry feature as well.

3
4 Marty mentioned that this information will be on the East Goshen website or residents can
5 call Rick Smith. Marty commented that Sunoco has to comply with local ordinances. They
6 have to get a Stormwater Management permit, which they have applied for. The East
7 Goshen Township Noise Ordinance will be enforced. The decibel level is taken at the
8 property line of the receiving property. The limit is 60 decibels during the day.

9 **Board of Supervisors Questions**

10 **Carmen** - 1. He assumes that with the amount of manpower needed, they will be using
11 subcontractors. Will Sunoco be inspecting their work? Matt explained that there will be
12 3rd-party inspectors, certified welder inspectors, corrosion inspectors, environmental
13 inspectors, certified biologists, and x-ray technicians. Marty mentioned that the PUC has
14 inspectors too.

15
16 2. Carmen commented that since they will be working in various places at the same time,
17 will the residents of a development such as Bow Tree, which has 3 entrances, have
18 problems exiting from Bow Tree? Matt explained that all of their work sites, with the
19 exception of the one at Boot and North Chester, will be off of the road. They will have
20 flaggers to allow trucks in and out of their work area. Joe mentioned that PennDOT also
21 had to approve their traffic control plan.

22 3. Carmen asked, "When will you put up sound barriers?" Matt commented that after the
23 site is prepared, the sound barriers will be installed.

24
25 **Janet** - 1. If they are drilling through dense rock, is there any vibration that would impact
26 local properties? Matt answered no, not with the HDD.

27 2. Do you work through all seasons? Matt answered yes.

28 3. Describe the noise curtains. Matt explained that they use wood poles similar to
29 telephone poles with a thick soundproof fabric attached to the poles. They go completely
30 around the area where the drill rig is located.

31
32 **Chuck** - 1. Please explain the 20" and 16" completion times. Joe commented that the 20"
33 pipe should be completed and in service in the 3rd quarter of 2017. The 16" pipe should be
34 completed and in service in late 2018. Matt showed the plan for the intersection of Boot
35 Road and North Chester Road and explained the process to HDD both pipelines. He noted
36 that because the work area is narrow, they can't run 2 drill rigs at the same time.

37 2. When will the lines be put into service? Matt answered at final completion.

38 3. Chuck asked about security. Joe mentioned that Sunoco has been in contact with the
39 local police and state police. Matt commented that the equipment is expensive. They will
40 have a security guard at night at the work areas and if there is a problem, they will call the
41 police.

42
43 **Mike** commented that this pipeline is a portion of 6.2 million miles of pipelines in the
44 United States. He noted that Pennsylvania does not have a pipeline regulatory authority.
45 They vest it in the PUC and DEP. We will work hand-in-hand with these state agencies and
46 hope to have a meeting with them in the near future.

1 1. What are the most vulnerable aspects of this project? Mike feels safety is the first
2 concern. Matt commented that the government has guidelines for all aspects of the project
3 using 3rd-party inspectors. He explained how each weld is x-rayed and the coating that is
4 used and inspected. Post-construction hydro testing is done at 125% of operating
5 pressure. After the line is in service, 3rd-party inspectors look for any problems. Sunoco is
6 a member of PA 1 Call system and installs markers along the pipeline route. An aerial
7 patrol flies over the pipeline route once a week. The advantage of the HDD is that most of
8 the pipe is very deep. This minimizes that chance that someone will accidentally hit it while
9 excavating.

10 2. If an anomaly is discovered, how will it be handled? Matt commented that it will be
11 checked. If they have to, they will pull the pipe out and start over or drill another pipe. He
12 doesn't feel that it would be practical to excavate the pipe to make a repair on an HDD line.

13 3. They spoke about public improvements, i.e.; transportation, open space, etc. Will
14 Sunoco consider helping with a public improvement project in East Goshen? Mike added
15 that we will work with you and hope for a successful project.

16
17 Carmen mentioned that neighbors behind him have wells and Sunoco did pretesting. Will
18 post testing be after drilling or when the pipeline is in use? Matt answered the post testing
19 will be done as close to completion of drilling as possible.

20
21 Marty mentioned that only two states in the United States don't have an agency to oversee
22 the siting of pipelines – Alaska and Pennsylvania. He encouraged the public to contact their
23 legislators about this.

24 25 **East Goshen Residents Comments/Questions**

26 1. Joan Wegeman, 629 N. Speakman Lane – Are pipelines earthquake-safe? Matt
27 commented that all of the pump stations have monitors. If there is a vibration exceedance,
28 it sets off an alarm and the pipeline is checked; and if conditions warrant, shut down for
29 testing.

30
31 2. Ron Rubley, 1515 Ulster, Hershey Mill – Are maps available to show exactly where the
32 line will go? He would like a more detailed map. The one that was supplied for this
33 meeting is not very good. Joe will supply the Township with a pdf to put on the website.
34 He noted that the property lines on the pdf are not exact. Mr. Rubley commented that the
35 residents in Hershey Mill want to know how close it will come to them.

36
37 3. Anthony DiFlavis, 1501 E. Grand Oak Lane – He has vibration cracks from 20 years ago.
38 Where is the steel coming from? Since PA is short of inspectors, he feels Sunoco should pay
39 for temporary inspectors. Matt commented that the pipeline is domestically made in the
40 USA and coated in Pittsburgh.

41
42 4. Richard Hunsinger, 304 Joseph Drive – There are old trees in the easement area.
43 Vibration will disturb them and they may fall. He asked how many hours per day they will
44 work and will there be flood lights used? Matt verified that they will be working from 7am
45 to 10pm, 7 days/week. The enclosed cab on the drill rig has lighting in it for night hours.
46 They can document the condition of a foundation before construction.

1 Mr. Hunsinger mentioned fracking and the contamination of wells and road damage the
2 drilling companies caused in Western PA. Are you planning to use water? Matt explained
3 how they use water. If something fails on the roads, he knows the Township will contact
4 him. PennDOT will also be inspecting the roads.

5
6 Mr. Hunsinger commented that tankers are his concern and the damage they can do. Joe
7 McGinn mentioned that PennDOT will be sure Sunoco makes road repairs.

8
9 5. Steve Solay, Summit House – He read that Sunoco has had 200 gas leaks, so, how can we
10 be sure this pipeline will be safe? Joe McGinn commented that their first priority is human
11 safety. Sunoco exceeds all state and federal requirements. The system constantly monitors
12 itself. There are a number of items being done to protect the safety of the line. The PUC
13 requires that they meet all local ordinances. He spoke about the economic benefit locally of
14 the pipeline. The end destination is Marcus Hook. They hope to expand it in the future,
15 creating more jobs.

16 Marty commented that the residents along the pipeline do not get a direct benefit and
17 encouraged those in attendance to talk to our legislators. He noted we have more pipelines
18 than any township in Chester County.

19
20 6. Elizabeth Byers, 1607 Margo Lane – She lives in an area close to the pipeline and is
21 concerned about possible explosion and how EMS would be able to help. The material
22 Sunoco is transporting is highly toxic. Sunoco has the worst record in regard to spills. She
23 spoke about 2 local incidents in southeast PA. These pipes are thinner than the current
24 pipes. ¾ of a million barrels of fuel will be piped through per day and most is going
25 overseas. How are you going to get people out if there is an emergency? Joe McGinn
26 mentioned that the Edgemont Township incident was not a part of the Mariner System and
27 there was no well damage. In the Aston Township incident, the leak detector worked
28 correctly and Sunoco took the line out of service for repair.

29
30 Matt explained that the existing pipeline is .322” and installed in 1930. The steel today is
31 lighter and stronger. Some areas of the pipe will be thicker than .322”. Joe McGinn
32 commented that EMS preparedness and working with first responders is key. They
33 provided training to the Goshen Fire Co. Sunoco has its own fire company in Marcus Hook.
34 There are guidelines for response to an emergency. As far as a leak or incident on a line,
35 you have to look at the difference in those incidents. The challenge is getting accurate
36 information.

37
38 Elizabeth suggested that they look at the Middletown report, which she thinks came from
39 the Sierra Club.

40
41 7. Grant Everhart, Chief, Goshen Fire Company - Commented that the fire company is
42 responsible for most of East Goshen. He has been Chief for 25 years. The firefighters are
43 equipped and trained to handle all incidents. There have been no serious incidents with
44 the pipelines in East Goshen. All fire fighters are certified in accordance with state and/or
45 national standards. He explained the levels of training the firefighters received. With a
46 hazardous materials incident, they can bring in additional resources from the County. With

1 a pipeline incident, they will notify Sunoco immediately, establish a perimeter to keep
2 people out and get people out. He noted that no two incidents are the same, so their
3 procedures may vary.
4

5 8. Marcia Gordon, 3008 Valley Drive – Because of the volatility of the fuel, will first
6 responders be allowed on the site? She is very concerned about residents close to the
7 pipeline. She is upset that the residents have no say in this project. Since Sunoco has a bad
8 batting average, she is asking that a fund be set up for life insurance and increase in
9 homeowners insurance because of the pipeline. She is also concerned about the resale
10 value of homes. Her information is that since 2006 there have been over 200 leaks, mostly
11 due to valves that don't work. Who does inspections? Joe McGinn mentioned that natural
12 gas liquids have not had leaks. In locations near pipelines, there is significantly more
13 awareness now. It is not unusual for several pipelines to exist in the same area. Property
14 damage will be handled by Sunoco. He isn't aware of any decrease in property values.
15 Matt commented that the government has requirements about inspections. They show up
16 unannounced to audit the records of inspections. Their plan is very comprehensive.
17 Ms. Gordon is concerned that an inspector may not follow through. Matt explained that
18 inspectors are qualified by a 3rd party, not Sunoco. The government puts limits on what
19 information can be released to the public.
20

21 9. Bernie Goldberg, 498 Jefferson Way – Asked if Sunoco had provided revised plans
22 addressing the comments in the Township engineer's review letter. Marty commented
23 that Sunoco has met with Pennoni and provided them with updated E&S plans. When
24 Pennoni approves, the Township will issue the E&S permit.
25

26 10. Michael Leff, 412 Misak Dr. – He feels 60 decibels is low. How is the ordinance
27 enforced? Marty commented that the Township will monitor the noise levels. If you have
28 concerns, call the Township building.
29

30 11. Lori Kier, 619 Marydell Dr. – There is no federal oversight of stormwater management
31 in PA. Contact your legislators about this.
32

33 12. Donald Stapleton, 801 Irene Dr. – What procedures will be taken to protect the other
34 utilities? Matt explained that they have to locate all local utility lines, get a positive
35 location, and meet with the utilities to review the plan. They like to have 10 feet of
36 separation. Areas of concern are the first 20 feet of the drill and any open cut areas. They
37 will adjust the distance from others if needed. They will make a PA 1 Call so the other
38 utilities have to come out and mark their facilities.

39 Mr. Stapleton asked if Sunoco's central control system is being protected from hacking.
40 Matt commented on the types of protection they have in place for the system.
41

42 13. Skip Chalfont, 1607 Margo La. – They did not get a notification of the previous meetings
43 and some people did not get a notice about this meeting. Carmen suggested signing up for
44 Constant Contact through the Township website to get up-to-date information.
45 Mr. Chalfont asked if they just use water and no chemicals. Matt mentioned that they use
46 90% water and 10% bentonite clay which is a DEP-approved drilling fluid.

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14. Gregory Saylor, 1363 Mark Dr. – Where will you start and end? Matt explained that several drill rigs will be set up at the same time.

Mr. Saylor – Will both pipelines be completed at the same time? Matt explained that the 20” line will be done in the 3rd quarter of 2017 and the 16” line in 2018.

Mr. Saylor – If you take down trees, do you have to replace them? Matt mentioned that they do not plan to take trees down. All work spaces will be restored.

15. Jim Coates, 1600 Williams Way – Have they requested to work more than 7 am to 10 pm 7 days per week? Marty answered no.

Mr. Coates – Will there be another meeting? Marty commented only if they need input from residents. Mr. Coates feels the PUC and DEP should be at a meeting.

Mr. Coates is concerned about the traffic area in front of Matlack Florist. Accidents have occurred there. Matt mentioned that PennDOT will check the area and may require flaggers to direct the traffic to and from the site.

Mr. Coates – How many contractors are from out of state? Joe commented that there are 2200 people at Marcus Hook. They pull from local contractor union halls first. The pipeline is the same – 100% building trades.

Mr. Coates – Has tree clearing been done? Matt commented they have had aerial inspections done for the existing pipelines. Any trees that grow on the easement would be trimmed as needed. They will get Mr. Coates’ information after the meeting and have someone contact him.

16. Lex Pavlo, 611 S. Speakman La. – He and his wife work from home. He is concerned about the noise and complained about what the designation of “temporary storage” for his property meant. Matt commented that at a previous meeting they were told that some of the land agents were not very professional and that Sunoco had worked to address this complaint. He explained what type of equipment will be used for the project.

17. Susan Hudson, 1631 Bow Tree Dr. – Is the blast zone information on the website? Has this type of pipe been used before? Matt verified they provide this information to PHMSA, the federal agency that regulates pipelines, and that this type of pipe was used on Mariner 1.

Ms. Hudson – What is the percentage of failures on new construction? Matt was not aware of any failures.

18. Tony Perretta, 1601 Bane Way – He was at a previous meeting and spoke with a land agent about when the project will start and asked, “Why don’t the land agents have this information?” He also asked about the two areas in an easement – work and permanent. What work will happen in the work area? Matt commented there will be a pit, drill machine, and tank.

Mr. Perretta understands that his property will be used for pipe layout. Matt explained what the area will be used for.

1 Mr. Perretta is concerned about noise and lights. In the 1980's there was pipeline work and
2 he received no notice. His backyard was full of equipment when he came home one day.
3 He has talked to lots of people including PennDOT. He complained about the land agents.
4 He went to court and lost. He feels Sunoco should pay more for the use of his property. He
5 would like Matt to come to his property.

6
7 19. Christine Caputo, 1410 Mill Creek Dr. – It isn't clear on the plan what is going to
8 happen at Jacquelyn Drive in front of the Village Square Shopping Center. Matt showed on
9 the plan where the drill will be set up. He explained what else will happen in that area.

10
11 20. Christopher Ursillo, 1404 Grand Oak La. – He lives in the lowest point in this
12 neighborhood. Could the depths that you are going to affect the water table? Matt
13 commented that generally it doesn't affect the water table.

14 Mr. Ursillo – Do you disturb springs? Matt commented that springs are more likely to be
15 impacted by trenches, not drilling. He doesn't anticipate a problem with the water table.

16
17 21. Karen Martynick, 702 Sycamore Dr. – She has been involved in helping landowners
18 deal with the Williams pipeline. How long have the work hours of 7am to 10pm been in
19 effect? Marty commented this has been in the Ordinance for quite a while.

20 Ms. Martynick – They got Williams to agree to not work on weekends. She feels the
21 Township should insist that Sunoco do more. Middletown got \$1 million for the right-of-
22 way through their park. She feels they should release the blast zone information about the
23 pipeline. Other companies have released information about their pipelines.

24
25 22. Darren Stoltzfus, 435 Gateswood Dr. - He just purchased his property and his backyard
26 will be affected by the noise and lights. If there is a problem, who should he contact? Marty
27 advised him to call Rick Smith.

28
29 **Public Comments/Questions**

30 1. Charles Williams, 200 Lenni Rd., Middletown Township - Do you have someone to check
31 the credentials of the pipeline workers? Joe explained the process of getting contractors.

32 Mr. Williams feels that the Sunoco contractors should be certified with the Township just
33 like a local plumber, etc. has to.

Dear Supervisors:

I appreciated the opportunity to comment on the Mariner East 2 project at your meeting earlier this week and express my concerns based on my experience with pipeline projects in Lancaster County. For the past three years, Lancaster Farmland Trust, of which I am the Executive Director, has assisted landowners in negotiating rights-of-way agreements for the Mariner East pipeline as well as the Rock Springs and Atlantic Sunrise pipelines (Williams/Transco). I have twice testified before the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission and have filed comments with FERC regarding the Atlantic Sunrise pipeline. Lancaster Farmland Trust has been recognized as an “intervenor” by FERC and has filed a lawsuit against Williams/Transco for violating a conservation easement.

I have learned a great deal from these experiences. The most important - for the purposes of this letter - is that the oversight and diligence of township officials will make the difference between safety and danger for the residents you were elected to protect.

While the regulation of pipelines is vested primarily in federal and state government, it does not mean your hands are tied as you suggested at the meeting. There are many things you can – and should – do to make our community safe during construction and after the pipeline goes into service.

I was surprised to learn that construction on the project is permitted to run 15 hours a day, seven days a week for 16 months or more. I think it is offensive to allow this activity on days of religious observance. I also think it is a terrible burden to force residents to be subjected to this construction continuously for such an extended period of time with no relief. I recognize that the township has an ordinance that permits this but I would be surprised if the supervisors anticipated a non-stop 16 month-long drilling project when the ordinance was considered.

A similar situation with Williams/Transco resulted in their agreement to halt construction on Sundays except in the case of an emergency. This was negotiated between Lancaster Farmland Trust and Williams/Transco even in townships where construction was permitted seven days a week because construction on Sundays offended the religious beliefs of the impacted landowners. This agreement was reached just weeks before construction began and has since been included in all agreements entered into by Williams.

Similarly, I was surprised to learn that the township has not received - nor requested - a map showing the "hazard zone" – the area of potential impact within which there would be immediate damage to people and property. Regardless of what the representatives from Sunoco said at the meeting, they certainly have this information. In fact, I think it is safe to assume that Sunoco has multiple models to assess risk and should be required to share those with the township, emergency response personnel, and residents.

Without knowing the likely area that would be immediately impacted, how can emergency responders be expected to effectively and efficiently plan for and respond to an explosion or leak? Additionally, landowners who live within the hazard zone should be notified that they are in the area of likely impact so that they can respond appropriately and safely should an emergency occur. This is NOT a situation where "ignorance is bliss". You have a responsibility to notify the residents of the potential danger – whether or not it ever occurs.

It was clear from the questions asked by the supervisors and the answers the supervisors gave to residents' questions, that the township is not prepared for this project and has no conception of the potential disruption and danger it poses. The extent to which the supervisors hid behind the cloak of "not our job" indicated that the supervisors did not accept their role to oversee this project and assure the residents experience as little disruption and as much safety as possible.

Other townships are doing much more to educate themselves and protect their citizens. Middletown Township has commissioned a quantitative study to assess the risk of the Mariner East 2 project (<https://stateimpact.npr.org/pennsylvania/2017/01/26/middletowns-pipeline-critics-welcome-risk-study/>). Additionally, Middletown Township negotiated a ROW agreement for \$1.8 million – clearly in excess of the value of the ROW – to offset some of the disruption caused to their community. West Goshen Township recently filed a complaint with the PUC against Sunoco for failing to uphold the conditions of agreements reached with the township regarding both the Mariner East 1 and 2 projects. Municipalities in New Jersey are actively fighting the PennEast pipeline project. To say that a municipality has no jurisdiction, ignores the power you, as township officials, have to influence this project.

Finally, I must admit my disappointment in the supervisors' failure to challenge Sunoco at both meetings I attended. At times, the supervisors' responses to residents' questions sounded

more like commercials for Sunoco than probing inquiries into the impact on the township. The exchanges between the supervisors and the representatives from Sunoco seemed much too collegial and raised questions about the relationship between Sunoco and township officials and whether or not the township was putting the best interests of its residents before those of Sunoco.

As I did at the meeting, I urge the supervisors and township staff to accept their responsibility to keep our community safe, educate yourselves on the implications of the project, demand the critical information from Sunoco, and “get tough” with Sunoco before it’s too late. Your failure to do so will put our community at risk both now and in the future.
