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LETTER FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Dear Friends, Neighbors and Fellow Residents,

On behalf of the Board of Supervisors and Township staff, I would like to wish you all a very happy holiday season! I hope that you are all able to spend ample time with family and friends over the next few weeks.

I am very pleased to report—and only partly in jest—that Santa Claus arrived early in East Goshen this year. Since the last newsletter was published in September, the Township has been awarded nearly \$1 million in grants for the planned improvements at the Milltown

and Hershey Mill Dam open spaces. The recent grants are in addition to over \$500,000 in previously awarded grants for these sites, plus over \$3.5 million in grants for the Paoli Pike Trail and the new destination playground.

If you're doing the math at home, that's over \$5 million in awarded grants over the past several years. As always, a special shout out goes to Jason Lang, our Director of Parks and Recreation and grant-writing *wunderkind*, for his excellent work in securing this funding.

In early December, the Township adopted its 2019 budget and 2019-2023 Capital Improvement Plan, which lays out all the planned capital projects and funding sources over the next five years. Based on that plan, we are targeting 2019 and 2020 to complete the improvements at the Hershey Mill Dam site; 2020 to complete the improvements at the Milltown Dam site; and 2020 and 2021 to complete the segments of the Paoli Pike Trail between North Chester Road and Reservoir Road

The **Township's new Pipeline Task Force** had its first meeting on November 12. This group, which has been tasked with advising the Board and making recommendations on pipeline legislation and regulatory matters (among various other responsibilities), is made up of five very talented individuals, and the Board looks forward to working with them as they hit the ground running in the months to come. The members of the Task Force are Judy DiFonzo, Russ Frank, Caroline Hughes, Karen Miller and Bill Wegemann.

In October, Sunoco announced that it plans to complete construction on the Mariner 2 and 2x pipeline in late 2020. However, we don't know precisely when it expects to complete

work in East Goshen specifically. As many of you know, in the interim, Sunoco will be conveying natural gas liquids temporarily through Chester County via an existing 12 inch line already in the ground.

Unfortunately, due to the heavy rains over the past several months, we have had to temporarily halt dredging the Marydell Pond until later in the winter. The ground was simply too wet to make adequate progress. However, we are hopeful that our crews will be back on site before the spring newsletter arrives in mailboxes and that we can implement a landscaping plan in the fall of 2019.



The negotiating team representing East Goshen and Westtown Townships were, unfortunately, unable to reach an agreement with the Westtown-East Goshen Police Association on the terms of the next police labor agreement. As of this writing, the two sides are scheduled to go to binding arbitration in the spring, where a panel of three arbitrators will determine the details of the next labor agreement. Special thanks go to East Goshen Supervisors Janet Emanuel and Mike Lynch, along with Westtown Supervisor Scott Yaw, for working tirelessly and productively with the Police Association to hammer out a deal, even if both sides were ultimately unable to find common ground on all the issues.

The Township held a very productive and well-attended meeting on October 25th on a proposal to amend the Township's zoning ordinance to allow for duplexes and triplexes on undeveloped parcels of over 20 acres in the R-2 zoning district, the predominant residential zoning district in the Township, with no change in the maximum density of one housing unit per available acre. Currently, only single family detached homes are allowed in the R-2, and concern has been raised about the potential loss of open space and environmental impact from the continued building of detached homes, rather than two or three-unit townhomes, which can be built more closely together. Importantly, under this proposal, no change in the total number of individual dwellings that can be built on a parcel is recommended—there would still be a maximum of one dwelling unit (or, in layman's terms, one front door) per acre. As a result, building duplexes and triplexes has the

potential to preserve more open space than if detached homes, with their much larger front, side and rear yard set-back requirements, were to be built. Thank you to the many residents who turned out that night to share their concerns. Township staff is gathering further information for the Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors, and hopefully, we will be in a position to make a final decision in early 2019.

As mentioned in previous newsletters, the Township has an e-mail communication called **Constant Contact.**Residents are able to receive timely information on specific areas of interest. Residents can sign up by going to the Township's website at www.eastgoshen.org. Residents are also encouraged to sign up for ReadyChesco, an emergency notification system, to be made aware of any emergency in your area. **ReadyChesco** uses mapping technology to tailor specific messages to residents based on where they work or live. Beards for Charity

Westtown-East Goshen Police Department will be joining the Willistown Township Police Department, West Goshen Township Police Department, East Whiteland Township Police Department, and Malvern Borough Police Department in Beards for Charity. The charities that will benefit from their efforts are "Unite for Her" and "Beards for Buc."

"Unite for Her" is a West Chester based nonprofit charity committed to helping women diagnosed with breast cancer navigate their way through treatment by providing complementary therapies designed to promote physical and emotional wellness.

"Beards for Buc" is a new endeavor undertaken this year. "Buc" or Sergeant Christopher Sambuco from the Caln Township Police Department suddenly and unexpectedly passed away in April of 2018 leaving behind an extended law enforcement family, as well as a wife and four young children. OPERATION SAFE STOP 2018



On Wednesday, October 24, 2018, the Westtown-East Goshen Regional Police Department partnered with the West Chester Area School District and Krapf Bus Company to monitor school bus stops in conjunction with Operation Safe Stop. Members of the Traffic Safety Unit examined past traffic complaints involving school bus stop violations and identified two local bus routes with high levels of complaints where motorists fail to stop for activated lights at bus stops.

Members of the Traffic Safety Unit rode on school buses and monitored activities at each stop. During the operation one motorist was observed driving through the activated stop lights on East Pleasant Grove Road and Skiles Boulevard in Westtown Township. A marked patrol vehicle was able to stop this driver and issue citations for the violation.

Pennsylvania's School Bus Stopping Law requires motorists to stop at least 10 feet away from school buses

that have their red lights flashing and stop arm extended. Motorists must stop when they are behind the bus, meeting the bus or approaching an intersection where a bus is stopped. Motorists following or traveling alongside a school bus must also stop until the red lights have stopped flashing, the stop arm is withdrawn, and all children have reached safety. If physical barriers such as grassy medians, guide rails or concrete median barriers separate oncoming traffic from the bus, motorists in the opposing lanes may proceed without stopping.

Motorists found to be in violation are issued a citation for Section 3345(a) Meeting or Overtaking a School Bus. The penalty for the violation is a \$250 dollar fine, a 60 day license suspension followed by five points when the license is restored.





UPDATE ON THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AT THE WEST GOSHEN SEWER PLANT

The East Goshen Municipal Authority (EGMA) is responsible for the management and disposal of effluent wastewater generated in East Goshen Township. Approximately 25% of that wastewater is handled by our own plant, the Ridley Creek Sewer Plant, located off Towne Drive in the southeastern end of the Township. The remainder is transferred by a series of pumping stations to the West Goshen Wastewater Treatment Plant on South Concord Road, which is operated by the West Goshen Sewer Authority (WGSA).

The WGSA plant was expanded in 1977, and East Goshen was one of four other townships that entered into agreements with the WGSA for the treatment of wastewater. West Goshen contributes about 60% of the wastewater flow into the plant, with the other townships making up the remaining 40%, thereby distributing the fixed costs among a greater number of users. For its part, East Goshen has "reserved capacity" of one million gallons of wastewater per day at the WGSA plant, or 16.7% of the plant's total capacity of 6 million gallons per day. Therefore, East Goshen is responsible for 16.7% of the costs of any capital improvements at the WGSA plant. By contrast, East Goshen's share of the WGSA operating costs-e.g. worker salaries, chemicals used during treatment, utility expenses, etc-is based on total actual sewage "flows" from East Goshen divided by total flows to the WGSA Plant in any given year, a figure that varies modestly from year to year. These operating and capital costs, along with the cost of operating and maintaining our own Ridley Creek Sewer Plant, four pump stations and 86 miles of sewer lines, are borne by quarterly sewer bills sent to the 8,600 homes and businesses in the Township connected to the sewer system.

regulations for its plant and sewer systems. These improvements include a new anaerobic digester, enhanced chemical addition processes, improved headworks, advanced water treatment system and pumping station upgrades, and other repairs, with a total estimated project cost of \$27.4 million. The EGMA is responsible for 16.7% of the capital project costs, or about \$4.5 million. As expected with such a large project, many of the engineering improvements involve major construction, legal permitting, and some are sequential in nature. The overall construction effort is expected to continue for two more years, until the end of 2020.

The EGMA's share of these costs was included as part of the larger 2017

East Goshen Township bond issue. When amortized, these plant improvements result in modest increases in the quarterly sewer rates, but

are required for the safe and effective operation of the WGSA treatment plant. The EGMA is actively monitoring the construction project by attending WGSA meetings and conducting periodic site visits to the plant to view the work in progress. In this manner, the EGMA continues to be good stewards of resident dollars, but also an advocate for environmentally sound operations within the current regulatory framework.

BEWARE THE LATEST MENACE TO CHESTER COUNTY: THE SPOTTED LANTERNELY

The Chester County Health Department is receiving a surge in

the number of calls about the Spotted Lanternfly – in both rural and urban areas. You have likely heard that the Spotted Lanternfly is the latest invasive insect pest that threatens our natural



habitats, managed landscapes, and farms and forests. This is potentially the worst invasive pest since the introduction of the gypsy moth nearly 150 years ago.

This Asian planthopper was found for the first time in the United States in Berks County, Pennsylvania, in 2014. It has since spread throughout 13 counties in southeastern Pennsylvania, currently under quarantine, including Chester County. The insect has recently been found in New Jersey and Virginia.

This insect threatens not only about \$18 billion of agricultural products in Pennsylvania, but it can make outdoor areas unusable by excreting a sticky substance called honeydew, which serves as a host for sooty mold. Furthermore, the presence of the Spotted Lanternfly could threaten the shipment of goods over state lines and from the port of Philadelphia, should restrictions be placed on the movement of Pennsylvania products.

Since it is new to the United States, little is known about its behavior and biology, but researchers in the Penn State College of Agricultural Sciences and United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) are working tirelessly to gather scientific data on how to contain and manage this pest. The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA) and USDA are leading the strategy and implementation of containment and control efforts, while the college focuses on research, education, and outreach.

Working with PDA and USDA, Penn State Extension has launched a spotted lanternfly website that serves as the primary hub for the most up to date information on this insect. To help stop the spread, the public can visit this website to learn how to identify spotted lanternfly and to report any potential sightings for action by PDA. Visit https://extension.psu.edu/have-you-seen-a-spotted-lanternfly to learn more.

You will also find an online course that provides businesses with the necessary training to receive a PDA permit that is required for companies operating in the quarantine zone to move equipment and goods within and out of the zone.



WHEN IN DOUBT THROW IT OUT!



SEWER/REFUSE DISCOUNT PROGRAM

As you may know, East Goshen Township offers a 5% discount on utility bill to residents who meet certain criteria, including eligibility for the following state and federal programs:

- Senior Citizen Property Tax or Rent Rebate Act
- Pharmaceutical Assistance Contract or the Elderly Act (PACE)
- Federal Food Stamp Act of 1977, as amended through 2030
- Women's, Infants and Children's Nutrition Improvement Act
- · Aid to Families with Dependent Children
- Public Assistance Law

Latest News from the Parks & Recreation Commission

The holiday season is in full gear and the Park Commission has much to be thankful for! The new playground opened this past June,

and we could not be more pleased with its reception so far! We've even heard "locals" have taken to calling it "Disney North"! We look forward to many more joyous years of seeing kids race down the zip line and roll down the play mounds! Programmatically, look for the Toddler Storytime to kick off next spring in partnership with the Malvern Library, and next July to be chock full of Tuesday at 10am special events! May to September dates usually book three months out, and we anticipate demand to increase with the new playground.

As we take a look back at 2018, we are blessed to have received an **additional \$933,000** in grant funding for the Milltown and Hershey's Mill Dam Park projects. 

WINTER WEATHER AND SNOW REMOVAL:

Pre-storm Preparedness Checklist:

- ✓ No on-street parking to allow efficient and safe plowing/salting
- Clear snow from any fire hydrants on or near your property
- Keep a safe distance from all plow trucks
- ✓ Avoid all unnecessary travel
- Keep your pets inside and make sure they have a seven day supply of food
- ✓ Have sufficient supplies of essential items in the event of power outages, including medications, water, non-perishable food, baby supplies, flashlights, batteries and propane for your grill.
- ✓ Have dry wood in a garage or covered for the fireplace or woodstove
- ✓ Fill up your vehicles





Snow Removal:

- We put a layer of brine on the road before the snow event starts; this prevents snow from bonding to the pavement and creating ice.
- Then we put a layer of salt down on the roads when the snow event starts.
- Once the snow starts to accumulate, the plows make at least one pass through every Township street until the snow stops. This is done to ensure that emergency vehicles can access your property throughout the storm event.
- When the snow stops, we begin to clear the streets by pushing the snow to the curb.
- Cul-de-sacs and storm drains are the final areas to be cleaned up after a storm.

Important Information on Snow Removal:

- Do not park on the street during a snow event.
- When shoveling your driveway leave the last six feet of your driveway un-shoveled until the plowing has ceased. This un-shoveled part will allow the snow being pushed by the plow to remain on the plow and not end up in your driveway.
- When clearing your driveway, do not deposit the snow into the roadway. This can cause hazardous conditions to other motorists.
- The Township does not plow residential driveways.
- If an ambulance has been called to an address in the Township, we will help bring in the emergency vehicle.
- Please remember that we cannot be everywhere at once. We will plow all roads in order of traffic priority—main roads then secondary roads.
- Our snow plow drivers are asked to take precautions to avoid striking mailboxes with their plows but snow can be extremely heavy and a cold brittle mail box can come down easily.



Mailboxes:

- Expensive or ornate mailboxes should be replaced with a basic mailbox for the winter months
- Mailboxes should be located so the face of the box is 6 8 inches from the edge of the roadway. This is according to USPS guidelines. We suggest you put them as far as 15 inches back from the road edge.
- Is your mailbox sturdy? Plastic mailboxes tend to become brittle from the sun's UV rays.
 Make sure the door on the mailbox is closed tightly. If the door is missing or open the mailbox may "fold" on impact from the snow.
- The East Goshen Board of Supervisors has passed a resolution that states the Township will reimburse a resident \$25 for replacement or repair of a damaged mailbox, provided the resident has notified the Township within one week of the storm. The Township does not repair or replace mailboxes.

STORMWATER IN THE WINTER: IT'S EVERYONE'S BUSINESS ENVIRONMENTALLY-FRIENDLY WINTER DEICING TIPS FOR RESIDENTS

Excess salt and other deicing chemicals can harm aquatic life in our streams and impact drinking water supplies. This winter, you can help by following these *environmentally-friendly* snow removal practices:

- Shovel snow before it turns to ice to limit the need for deicing chemicals like rock salt.
- Shovel snow onto permeable surfaces including gently sloping and level land-scape and grassy areas so as the snow melts it will soak into the ground rather than flow directly into a nearby storm drain or stream.

If you must use deicing chemicals, follow these suggestions:

- Control application of chemical deicers and avoid over application.
- Limit chemical applications near environmentally-sensitive areas including springs, streams, ponds, wetlands, and water supply areas and sensitive landscape and vegetation
- Sand and sawdust can be used as an environmentally-friendly alternative to commonly-used salt products.
- Use salt substitutes that are less harmful including Calcium Chloride (CaCl2) and Calcium Magnesium Acetate (CMA).
- For larger areas, apply salt as a brine solution to prevent drift off of paved surfaces.
- After snowmelt, sweep up residues, including sand, to prevent them from washing into storm drains and streams

Why should I limit my use of salt and other chemical deicing products?

Deicing products contain chemical constituents that can be harmful to the environment including water resources and drinking water supplies. For example, sodium can break down soil structure and decrease soil permeability, which adversely impacts vegetation and soil microbes; chloride mobilizes heavy metals and impacts fresh water supplies including ground and surface waters; and heavy metal components can adversely impact water quality, plant and aquatic life.

Winter driving can be hazardous and scary, especially in northern regions that get a lot of snow and ice. Additional preparations can help make a trip safer, or help motorists deal with an emergency. This sheet provides safety information to your residents to help prevent motor vehicle injuries due to winter storms.

THE THREE P'S OF SAFE WINTER DRIVING:

PREPARE for the trip;
PROTECT yourself;
and PREVENT crashes on the road.

PREPARE

- Maintain Your Car: Check battery, tire tread, and windshield wipers, keep your windows clear, put no-freeze fluid in the washer reservoir, and check your antifreeze.
- **Have On Hand:** flashlight, jumper cables, abrasive material (sand, kitty litter, even floor mats), shovel, snow brush and ice scraper, warning devices (like flares) and blankets. For long trips, add food and water, medication and cell phone.
- Stopped or Stalled? Stay in your car, don't overexert, put bright markers on antenna or windows and shine dome light, and, if you run your car, clear exhaust pipe and run it just enough to stay warm.
- Plan Your Route: Allow plenty of time (check the weather and leave early if necessary), be familiar with the maps/ directions, and let others know your route and arrival time.

Practice Cold Weather Driving!

- During the daylight, rehearse maneuvers slowly on ice or snow in an empty lot.
- · Steer into a skid.
- Know what your brakes will do: stomp on antilock brakes, pump on non-antilock brakes.
- · Stopping distances are longer on water-covered ice and ice.
- Don't idle for a long time with the windows up or in an enclosed space.

PROTECT YOURSELF

- Buckle up and use child safety seats properly.
- · Never place a rear-facing infant seat in front of an air bag.
- · Children 12 and under are much safer in the back seat.

PREVENT CRASHES

- · Drugs and alcohol never mix with driving.
- · Slow down and increase distances between cars.
- · Keep your eyes open for pedestrians walking in the road.
- Avoid fatigue Get plenty of rest before the trip, stop at least every three hours, and rotate drivers if possible.
- If you are planning to drink, designate a sober driver.
