Lex Pavlo supported Russ' comment stating he was stunned that further analysis is not being done at this time as it is important to public safety.

Ron Cocco thanked the TF for their time and effort in representing Township residents. He expressed concerned that he has witnessed for the last 2 weeks multiple grout and vac trucks around the New Kent site. Rick explained that this is part of the normal pipeline construction operations. Rick continued that based on his conversation with Sunoco representatives, voids in the ground can occur between the casings and outside of the pipe. To avoid future problems, Sunoco fills these holes with grout.

Joe Larkin also agreed with Russ and Lex stating that he finds it shocking that further investigation is not being done at this time.

Bernard also supported the previous comments stating that this would be money well spent to find out if the subsidence is serious.

Melissa DiBernardino said she was also concerned about the amount of time grout and vac trucks were at the New Kent site.

Update on Whistleblower Complaint

Caroline stated that she feels an investigation of the subsidence is paramount. The Township cannot rely on state agencies to have East Goshen's best interest in mind and move quickly with information. An investigation will either prove there is no threat / problem, or it will prove that there is a problem that supports the whistleblowers' report.

Rick gave an update on what is being done as listed on the East Goshen Township webpage. He added that the Township has been in communication with PennDOT. He has requested copies of any reports that are done. David stated that he has been in contact with state and county reps for assistance. He has been advised that the county cannot help us financially because they are facing the same fiscal challenges as local municipalities. The Township has not yet heard back from PennDOT. Representative Comitta's office is requesting that PennDOT excavate the site of the subsidence.

Christina questioned the method of excavating the site to which Rick explained that this is the typical way the Township investigates this type of problem.

Melissa thanked the TF for their work and said she is upset and frustrated by the Board's response from the 11/10 meeting. She feels that the whistleblower information is more credible than any information received to date. The Township could make a public statement and ask Sunoco to pay for the study.

 Bill referenced a DCNR report about sinkholes that Christina provided. He also referenced the September, 2020 HDD report that was mailed by Sunoco to residents that live within 450 feet of the pipeline. Based on the facts from these reports, the Pipeline TF should recommend immediately that a study be done by an independent geologist.

 Judi provided the link to the <u>DCNR document</u> and stated that page 13 illustrates how a sink hole happens and why there is concern about a depression in the ground.

David raised the question to the TF if the request to PennDOT to excavate the site should be withdrawn.

Gerry suggested that the digging should not occur until after the geologist report was complete. It was the consensus of the TF to not have PennDOT excavate the subsidence. David will talk with Representative Comitta to hold off on this request.

Caroline made a motion to obtain two (2) verbal estimates from Paul Rubin at HydroQuest Environmental Consulting, to perform a thorough geological analysis and subsurface mapping of 1) the area of the subsidence and 2) the area of HDD 500 (New Kent to just south past the 2nd entrance of Bow Tree). Bill seconded. The motion passed unanimously 5-0. Bill will make the initial call to Paul Rubin to talk about the proper testing technique needed. It was noted that this testing would have to be done in the PennDOT right-of-way or with the permission from the landowner.

Christina introduced information about Pennsylvania code, Title 42 - Matters Affecting Government Units. She noted that sections 85.22 & 85.42 refer to sovereign immunity and exceptions. She plans to do more investigation.

State House's first pipeline emergency bill signed

HARRISBURG — A long-sought bill to give local emergency services access to the disaster response plans of natural gas pipeline companies was signed into law by Gov. Tom Wolf on Wednesday.

This legislation has been debated for several years as incidents with spills, methane leaks and fires have occurred with natural gas pipelines being built through populated suburban areas.

House Bill 2293 is regarded as the first of nearly two dozen pipeline safety bills to have won final legislative passage during the past three years.

Because of security concerns regarding pipelines, HB2293 would require that officials who review these plans abide by a state law protecting confidentiality of public utility information.

A pipeline operator who doesn't comply with an access request could face enforcement action from the PUC under the bill.

"This bill is a great step to ensuring our emergency responders know the best approach to dealing with an issue concerning our existing pipeline infrastructure," said Rep. Chris Quinn, R-Delaware, the bill sponsor.

Mr. Quinn said that an agreement by Sen. Katie Muth, D-Montgomery, to withdraw an amendment helped steer the bill through the Senate. Ms. Muth's amendment would have required an operator to submit the emergency plans regardless of a request and make an operator liable for costs associated with an incident, said Mr. Quinn.

The Republican-controlled Senate couldn't reach agreement on the amendment, said Mr. Quinn.

"Sen. Muth's amendment would have strengthened my bill and I support it," said Mr. Quinn. "Unfortunately, the legislative process is often a difficult one and we needed to get something passes to better the current situation."

The impetus for this bill and Senate Bill 284 came after reports that an emergency management plan submitted to Chester County by Energy Transfer Partners for its Mariner II pipeline was redacted, Sens. Andy Dinniman, D-Delaware and Tom Killion, R-Chester, said last year.

 - The fourth presentation will cover how to recycle everything we possibly can to responsibly help protect our environment. Comp Plan Objective 10.2
- Collaboration with other East Goshen ABCs on potential joint projects.
- Once we have a number of workshops under our belts for young people in our elementary schools and park, we aim for a joint program with adjacent townships for the junior and high schools in our area.
- Work with other Environmental and Sustainability Advisory Committees from nearby municipalities.
