From The Chairman...



Dear Friends, Neighbors and Fellow Residents:

It is with great pleasure I write today on behalf of my fellow Supervisors, as summer is in full swing and many of us are enjoying a return to normalcy and more active lifestyles. I would like to thank all of our first responders and health care providers who have tirelessly worked over the last eighteen months through the COVID-19 pandemic. As of this printing, the Township Building has opened back up for recreational activities and we have begun in person ABC meetings, two very welcome changes indeed.



East Goshen Township hopes this will be a memorable summer season for all our Township residents, and welcomes everyone back to our public spaces this summer. Community Day is scheduled for Saturday, August 28, and we cannot wait to see a sea of smiling faces and the glint of fireworks sparkling in our children's eyes. The Paoli Pike Trail has been open since November, and we are encouraged to see the walkers and bikers using the trail with increasing frequency. Current open segments connect Line Road to the park system and parallels Paoli Pike down to Reservoir Road. We will be applying for a DCED Multimodal Transportation grant this summer to fund the remaining portion, segment B, from Reservoir Road to Ellis Lane. You

may have noticed, segment A from Airport Road to Ellis Lane is being constructed as we speak.

With regards to the Mariner 2 pipeline, Sunoco has completed all pipe installation in East Goshen Township and restorations are complete except for near the Rite-Aid on Boot Road. Sunoco has about one mile of pipe to construct in other areas of Chester and Delaware counties.

Adelphia Gateway is finishing up the improvements to the valve on Paoli Pike. While this is the only construction activity for this project in East Goshen, Adelphia has a significant amount of work to do at the compressor stations in Bucks and Delaware counties, so the line will not be placed in service anytime soon.

Work is also moving along on the Hershey’s Mill Dam Park project, with construction to be completed by September. This new 8.0 acre passive park will include internal trails and opportunities to access the water’s edge. Eighty six foot tall boulders will be placed along the water’s edge, created ripples, gentle whitewater and cascading water; it will be very picturesque and we think will become our “postcard-worthy” park in a few short years.

The plans for the Milltown Dam Park project are currently being reviewed by the state Department of Environmental Protection and the U.S. Army Corp. of Engineers. We anticipate the plans being approved this summer, with construction starting later this year.

Our joint project with West Goshen Township to repave and restripe Boot Road between Wilson Drive and Green Hill Road will soon commence construction. The project will result in an additional lane going towards Route 202, which should improve traffic flow.



The Board of Supervisors and staff presented Rick with a boulder this morning emblazoned with a plaque dedicated to the “rock” of the Township. Officials and staff remarked on his wonderful service, remarkable leadership skill and unflappable demeanor.

He will be truly missed.

The History of East Goshen Township... ...as told by its longest serving employee...

To the Residents of East Goshen and All of my Friends and Colleagues:

On June 16, 2021, I will be retiring as Township Manager. Since I have been at the Township for a long time, it was suggested that I write up the recent history of East Goshen from my perspective, so here it is:

For what it's worth, I was born in 1952 in West Chester (which, by the way, was the year East Goshen adopted its first zoning ordinance) and I have lived my entire life in East Goshen Township. In 1952, the population of East Goshen was about 1,000 and to most people was considered the "sticks," i.e., rural or backwoods area. I attended East Goshen Elementary School which at that time only had six classrooms. The highlight of the year (for a kid) was the Goshen Fair in August.

My uncle, Tom Smith, served on the Township Planning Commission in the 60s, and worked for East Goshen in various capacities until his retirement in 1985. I started working for the Township in the summer of 1969 as a laborer and I currently live in a house that was previously owned by Vance Bates, a former township supervisor.

Since West Chester Pike had a trolley in 1952, the Supervisors allowed for commercial uses adjacent to West Chester Pike. The West Chester Pike corridor originally only had a few small commercial establishments, like Supplees Farm Market and the Milltown Garage.


I remember the reconstruction of West Chester Pike when I was a kid from a two-lane road with trolley tracks on the south side to the four-lane configuration it is today. After the improvements, SEPTA had a bus route on West Chester Pike, and in the late 1960s, the new Route 202 was completed (replacing Paoli Pike), and it was possible to get from West Chester to the King of Prussia Mall in 20 minutes. The reconstruction of West Chester Pike and the convenient access to Route 202 set the course for development for East Goshen. The Supervisors believed it was good planning to continue to allow for more intensive uses in the corridor; and the corridor was developed with condominiums such as Summit House and apartments like Waterview and Racquet Club.

The corridor was also home to a development referred to as Goshen Heights or Milltown. The development was laid out in the 1920s by Harry Taylor with 25-foot-wide lots with streets and alleys much like a borough. People purchased as many lots as they could afford and built a house. There was a variety of housing styles including Sears Roebuck houses, several of which still exist today.

Most of the other land in East Goshen was zoned for one housing unit per acre, with on-lot sewer and water. When I first started at the Township there were still quite a few farms, although the seeds of development were sprouting with subdivisions like Vista Farms and Bittersweet that had been built in the early 60s. These subdivisions had one-acre lots with on-lot sewer and a well.

Fortunately, the Supervisors had the foresight to recognize that encouraging development with smaller lots that provided public sewer, public water, and open space was good planning. As a result, they enacted a single-family cluster provision that allowed for 25,000 square foot lots with all three of those amenities. Pin Oak Farms was the first of many developments that was built (1969) under this option, followed by Marydell Farms and Hershey Mill Estates.

The Supervisors also approved a relatively new land use concept at that time called a Planned Residential Development, or PRD. Under this concept, the developer would first present an overall plan for development. Detailed engineered plans for each phase would be presented at a later date, and then the project would be built. Hershey's Mill Village was originally approved in 1973 as a PRD with 2,687 homes and a golf course. Unfortunately, the development failed, and the bank took back the property. The bank then failed and the property went to the FDIC. In 1977, the FDIC conveyed the property to a new developer who came forward with a revised PRD plan with 2,323 homes for Hershey's Mill Village. The revised PRD was approved in 1978. This plan just showed the overall road system in Hershey's Mill, the location of the golf course and community facilities, and the location and size of each

village were to be submitted later. Hershey's Mill Village was finally completed with 1,720 homes in 2009, 31 years later. The housing market had changed as Hershey's Mill was being built out and the developer found out that buyers wanted larger homes. Since the area for each village was fixed, he ended up with fewer homes.

In 1964, Smith, Kline & French purchased the Applebrook Farm, which consisted of 55 acres on the north side of Paoli Pike and 280 acres on the south side. Their original plan was to develop the parcel on the south side of Paoli Pike as a corporate campus. They never followed through with their campus, although they did use the buildings at the west end of the property for animal studies. The Township acquired the 55-acre parcel from Smith Kline for use as a Township Park in 1975. In 1999, Pfizer, a successor to Smith Kline, put their 311-acre parcel up for sale. The Supervisors put together a coalition consisting of Applebrook Associates (a group of golfers looking to build a golf course), Brandywine Realty Trust, Chester County and the Township to make an offer to Pfizer. Applebrook Associates came up with \$10,000,000 to purchase 191 acres for the golf course and homes; Brandywine Realty Trust put up \$5,000,000 to purchase the existing office buildings on 20 acres; and the Township and County paid \$3,000,000 and \$2,000,000, respectively, to purchase what is now known as Applebrook Park.

The other significant development that occurred was the construction of "industrial parks" such the Brandywine Industrial Park, the Goshen Corporate Park, and Goshen Corporate Park West. The shopping channel, QVC, had its original studio in The Goshen Corporate Park, and Synthes USA, which is division of Johnson & Johnson, has a large presence in the Goshen Corporate Park West.

Of course, all of this development would not be possible without public water and public sewer. The Township was originally served by the Great Valley Water Company, a small water company located in Frazer, until it was acquired by Philadelphia Suburban Water Company, which is now known as AQUA.

On the public sewer side, in 1977, the Supervisors entered into a contract with West Goshen Township to treat sewage from East Goshen. A sewer line that collected sewage from both townships was installed along the Chester Creek, terminating at the Westtown Way Pump Station, which in turn pumped the sewage over the hill to the West Goshen Sewer Plant. West Goshen continues to treat our sewage, and they are currently undertaking a multi-million dollar upgrade to the treatment plant to comply with their discharge permit.

In the mid-1980s, Bernie Hankin, a local developer, approached the Supervisors with a proposal to build what is now known as the Ridley Creek Sewer Treatment Plant, designed to serve his 497 single-family cluster development called Bow Tree, the Smith Kline Beckman property, and other existing developments like Vista Farms. The Township entered into agreements with Hankin and Smith Kline in 1984 to construct the treatment plant. The Township expanded the treatment in 2010 and it currently treats sewage from homes on the east side of the Township.

Last but not least, on January 1, 1982, the Westtown-East Goshen Regional Police Department commenced operations. Prior to that date, the township residents relied on the State Police for police services. WEGO, as it is often called, was created in 1981 by the Supervisors of Westtown Township and East Goshen to provide police service to both townships. It was only the fifth regional police department created in the state. In 1993, WEGO began providing police services to Thornbury Township on a contract basis.

When people think of East Goshen they think of a suburban community of single-family homes on nicely-landscaped lots. However, we are a very diverse Township and over 60% of the homes in East Goshen are multifamily. As I am writing this article, you can purchase a condo in Goshen Valley for \$172,500; in the southeast part of the Township, a magnificent 6,800 sq. ft. home on 11 acres is for sale for \$6,875,000; and there is everything in between.

I have seen East Goshen grow from a rural community of small farms to one of the premier townships in Chester County.

As Sean Connery said to Kevin Costner in the movie *The Untouchables*, "Here endeth the lesson."

So much good to say about such a fine human being and man who has the unique ability to effectively and calmly deconstruct the most complex, controversial or unexpected events and situations that *is* the world of municipal management.

Rick is a manager's manager – ethical, humble, effective, efficient, accountable, accessible and universally respected in our world by his peers, fellow employees, and citizens – The Epitome of a Quiet Professional.

Were it not for Rick in my life, I very well might not have had a (30-year) career and tenure as a municipal manager in neighboring East Bradford Township, Chester County.

In 1991 I was the victim of downsizing; the country was in a 'mild' recession due to some combination of the 1990 oil price shock; debt accumulation of the 1980s, and growing consumer pessimism from the weakened economy to produce the brief recession. At that time my position as Associate Vice President with the Wooldridge Organization at The Villages of Hershey's Mill was vaporized. Like a failed mainspring of a watch, without a job, a young family and a mortgage I was in a state of shock with no time to lose. Rick Smith, who I had known for some years through my work at Hershey's Mill, was one of my first calls to share my situation. Rick, in his always calm, concise and caring manner of communication, informed of a new manager search at East Bradford Township and suggested it could be a good opportunity. The rest, as they say, is history.

Subsequent to my plunge into municipal management, Rick has remained an always available resource and mentor. I have learned so much from this kind gentleman over the now decades not just from his advice but from the observation of his countenance. I continue to learn from Rick each day now as a member of the EGT Board of Supervisors. Regrettably one skill I have not ever been able to learn from this master is his ability to be so damned effectively and pleasantly concise!

As he is The Master I shall remain honored to be the Grasshopper.
It is such a privilege to have you in my life.

So Now Louis 'Rick' Smith, Jr., while you may not have a Vincent Black Lightning 1952, may you and your Bonnie bride ride your Harleys safely and enjoyably to Golden Pond and beyond!!



Fertilize your lawn the easy way!

Disposing of grass clippings is the most labor-intensive part of mowing the lawn for many homeowners. You can skip all that work and let your grass clippings fertilize your lawn for free.

Grass clippings contain nitrogen and phosphorous and can fertilize your lawn naturally. This approach can cut or eliminate the need for additional fertilizers, which can damage our streams. Clippings can also be composted and used to create high-quality fertilizers for your garden.

Start mowing by making two or three passes blowing grass clippings into the center of your lawn, not the street or driveway. Make sure to mow when the grass is dry so that the clippings do not clump together. Set the mower to a height of 2½ to 3 inches to better hide clippings and keep a healthier lawn. Mow weekly in the spring and as needed through the summer.

Clippings left on your lawn will biodegrade quickly because they are 90% water. It should not cause thatch buildup. If the grass is very high (Say, after returning from vacation), consider making two cuts: a trim with the mower set "high", followed a few days later by a cut to your regular length. This will give the clippings a chance to degrade into the lawn and avoid having long clippings covering the lawn.

To be sure you are giving your yard the nutrients it needs and not providing too much fertilizer, test your soil. Contact your local Penn State Extension office to order a soil test kit for only \$9 (Chester County 610.696.3500, Delaware County 610.696.2655). They may also be available at local garden centers.

For your lawn and your streams, keep your grass clippings on your lawn. Your wallet will also appreciate the change, as you will need fewer fertilizers and less water.

Your Sustainability Advisory Committee has been hard at work!

Your response to our pilot program of free recycling totes with lids was impressive! Our informal betting pool guessed it would take from 2 days to a week for our township to give away the 100 totes we initially ordered. Instead, it only took a couple of hours. We now have 100 recycling ambassadors living in East Goshen Township!

We are requesting the board to order more, so if you or your family would like one as well, please send an email to sac@eastgoshen.org.

Our committee has entered into a working partnership with Willistown Conservation Trust to provide seminars, information and access to their programs. We hosted Lauren McGrath recently, who shared valuable information about pesticides and fertilizers, and how to help protect the purity and safety of our waterways, streams, wells and drainage system. This webinar is available for viewing on the YouTube section of East Goshen's website.

Lauren and another member of their staff will join us again soon for an in depth look at how to transition from all grass lawns to more sustainable garden areas with native plantings. These are easier to care for, require less watering, minimal chemical applications if any, and reduce our need for mowing. These plantings attract birds, butterflies and insects that help pollinate our Township. What's not to like about that!

For our more traditional East Goshen gardeners, you have a rare treat in store. East Goshen's new Gardener Laureate, Phillip Watson, invited us to film his own garden plantings. This video includes a wealth of suggestions for your garden. Look forward to an update later in the summer, and another in the fall. Philip will also be posting frequent short video blogs throughout the year. These will all be available

on the East Goshen website.

Thank you, East Goshen residents, for your robust response to our Crayon Initiative.

You donated over 40 pounds of crayons for recycling! Many are being shipped to California where they will be remade into new crayons and distributed to hospitals nationwide. And since a percentage of the crayons you donated were either brand new or barely used, we have saved these for local distribution as well.

We encourage all residents to recycle their single use plastic bags and plastic film. In addition to the bins available at places like Giant Groceries, we hope to have a bin available soon at the East Goshen park. We have two additional bins available, so if your business is interested in participating, please contact us care of sac@eastgoshen.org.

Lastly, we will soon begin contacting our local businesses to see how we might support them toward a more sustainable future. We are well aware how many of our businesses have taken tangible steps towards more ecological packaging, recycling, and transitions to green energy efficiency. We applaud these efforts despite a year of challenging economics. Soon we'll be thanking them publicly.
