# Chester County Vulnerability Assessment of Hazardous Liquid and Gas pipelines (part of the Chester County Hazard Mitigation Plan)

- Christina provided background on the Chester County's Vulnerability Assessment of Hazardous Liquid and Gas Pipelines which is part of the <u>Chester County Hazard Mitigation</u>

- on pipelines. A new plan was due in 2020, but due to COVID, there was a delay. The 2021
- version is in a draft format. It includes a detailed section on HVLs. Municipalities and cities
- 40 within Chester County should adopt this plan once finalized. The plan should also help
- mitigate the impact of risks such as floods, tornadoes, invasive species, hazardous releases etc.

The TF discussed the probability and risk charts provided in the document. Christina explained that this data shows that in Chester County there is a very high probability seeing

an incident happened involving a gas or liquid pipeline. In the past, it was always stated that an incident involving a gas or liquid pipeline was a low probability with a high consequence. This in turn provided a false sense of security.

Gerry noted that the data shows that the impact level of an Environmental Hazards was graded as "limited #2". He feels that pipelines should be rated higher. He also noted that further clarification regarding spatial extent and duration should be provided.

Christina noted the following data was utilized in conducting the vulnerability assessment:

- Population within the hazard zone.
- Number of structures within the hazard zone.
- Estimate replacement value of structures in hazard zone

Bill referenced Township maps that show 90% of the East Goshen Township population is impacted within ½ mile of a pipeline.

Christina referenced the <u>Chester County Emergency Operations Plan</u> from February 2019. The Planning Assumptions Section states that if there is an emergency or disaster, the responsibility first falls on the municipality. Then County will help once the municipality is overwhelmed. The State response will occur 24 hours after the incident. Lastly, Federal response will be within 48-72 hours.

Once the County completes the draft of the Hazard Mitigation Plan, all municipalities can adopt it by resolution. The County will collect and send the resolutions to FEMA.

The TF discussed that even though the public comment period on this draft has passed, it is still beneficial to submit comments to the coordinator.

Christina made a motion to ask the Board of Supervisors if it is acceptable for the EGT Pipeline TF to send comments regarding the Risk and Hazard Vulnerability Section regarding Hazardous Liquid Pipelines to the Chester County Coordinator that is working on the Hazard Mitigation Plan.

Bill seconded. The motion passed 4-0. This will be on the September  $25^{th}$  Board of Supervisors agenda.

The TF thanked Christina for her work on this summary.

Thanks for sharing the feedback from the Pipeline Task Force. At this point the plan has gone through all public comment periods along with PEMA and FEMA approval. Representative Dianne Herrin joined the Pipeline Task Force at their June 10<sup>th</sup> meeting. The recent pipeline leak incident at the Boot Road Pump Station was discussed. The consensus from the Task Force was that the residents and the public were not properly notified or informed during this event, and the current all-hazards response utilized by emergency workers is not sufficient for Mainer East emergency situations.

The following draft motions were recommended:

#### 1<sup>st</sup> DRAFT MOTION:

Mr. Chairman I move to ask that staff coordinate a combined meeting with East Goshen Township, West Goshen Township, and the Department of Emergency Services (DES) to discuss the topic of public notification and ask DES to provide a standard operating procedure (SOP) for pipeline emergencies.

#### 2<sup>nd</sup> DRAFT MOTION:

Mr. Chairman I move that the Board publicly acknowledge that the all-hazards response to Mariner East is not sufficient for public notification and emergency response.
