From The Chair...

Hello Neighbors!

It's hard to believe that this year has flown by so quickly! This is my last letter as Chair, and I look forward to supporting the next Supervisor we choose for the position in January. Reflecting over the past year, I can say it has been a privilege to serve the community as Chair of the Board of Supervisors!

As Chair, it falls to that person to explain things, good and bad, to the community. That means I must tell you that a tax increase was voted through for 2023. On December 20, 2022, the Board of Supervisors, in a vote of 3 to 2, voted in favor of passing a .5 mil increase of the township tax. While this represents a 40% increase, it is a much smaller increase in actual dollars than our school tax, but it is still an increase. I have included estimates on page 3 to provide an idea of how much this could mean to some communities in the township, but I have also included a link to the County website where you can enter your address to see what your own assessed rate is. On average, township-wide, the increase will amount to around \$125 more per property, but, again, the specific increased depends on the assessed value of your home. Take that assessed rate, multiply it by 0.00175 to calculate how much you will owe in township taxes. This information will be located on our website, and there will be a letter coming from the Township Manager to explain it as well (look for that in late January).

Why was this tax increased? The township is experiencing the same inflationary problems all of us are experiencing in our own households. In addition to inflation, townships must provide services (which are more expensive to implement due to supply chain shortages and inflation), emergency services (WEGO, Fire, Ambulance) and we have several large, expensive projects that must be done. Looking at the budget, our fine police department accounts for fully 60% of our entire budget each year. We will NOT defund our police. We did not choose to breech the Hershey's Mill Dam or the Milltown Dam and restore them to their pre-manmade dam state (this was a DEP and Army Corps

of Engineers requirement). There are 6 township owned ponds that are dying and need to be rehabilitated, none of which were on a schedule to be rehabbed until recent years. They will cost several hundred thousand dollars for each pond, even doing much of that work "in-house" with township Public Works leading the efforts.

Additionally, the township has taken out loans (referred to as "bonds" in government) which are coming due. When the Board of Supervisors took out the \$10 Million dollar loan for the Paoli Pike Trail, the Hershey's Mill Dam, the Milltown Dam, and the Westtown Way Sewer Treatment Plant upgrades in 2017, they did not know that costs would surpass the amount of the loan for the combined projects. When the Board borrowed money in 2003 to acquire 220 acres of open space (Applebrook), they implemented the 1.25 mil tax we have now. That was smart because they planned for the repayment of the loan at the time they received the loan. Taxes were not increased in 2017 when the township borrowed the \$10 million, which would have put us in a completely different situation today. The loan has come due, we must start paying it back.

As a township, we have been utilizing grant monies for many projects. Grants come with strings attached, in the form of "use by" deadlines, "match" requirements, and other more stringent rules. This grant money is a significant reason why we have not had to raise the township tax since it was implemented. Due to the exhaustive efforts of our vigilant staff, our township has been the recipient of millions of dollars in grants over the past two decades, and this is what has saved past Boards from raising taxes until now. While the current Board was divided on implementing an increase this year or waiting until next year, we all understand that "kicking the can down the road" to another Board is exactly what has been done in the past, and that cannot

happen any longer.

East Goshen Township AutoPay Electronic Payment Program - Sewer/Trash Bill

Optional Electronic Payment Program for utility bill:

This program is offered as a complimentary service to our residents. If enrolled in this electronic payment program, we will still mail the utility bill so you know how much it is, but it will indicate "STATEMENT ON-LY". Utility bills are mailed on/around January 15th, April 15th, July 15th, and October 15th and are due at the end of the following months. When enrolled, we will pull the quarterly utility bill amount, from the bank account provided, on February 20th, May 20th, Aug 20th, and November 20th (or the next business day if these are a weekend).

To enroll in the electronic payment program, please complete the form found on our website at www.eastgoshen.org, select SERVICES, FORMS AND APPLICATIONS, ELECTRONIC PAYMENT AU-THORIZATION FORM. Include a voided check with the completed form when you send it to the Township Building, 1580 Paoli Pike, West Chester, PA 19380. Alternatively, we have a drop box at the front of the building where you can place the completed form and voided check any time of the day or night, no postage necessary.

Sewer/Refuse Discount Program for LOW INCOME HOUSEHOLDS

In addition to state and federal programs that offer financial assistance to senior citizens and those with lower incomes, East Goshen Township offers a 5% discount on utility bill to residents who meet certain criteria. To be eligible for this discount, a resident must provide proof of enrollment in one of the following programs, along with completing the East Goshen Township's Discount Program form by December 31, 2022:

Senior Citizen Property Tax or Rent Rebate Act (file a PA1000 with the State) Pharmaceutical Assistance Contract or the Elderly Act (PACE) Federal Food Stamp Act of 1977, as amended through 2030 Women's, Infants and Children's Nutrition Improvement Act Aid to Families with Dependent Children



Residents already enrolled in this program must re-apply each year. The Discount Program Form is available by contacting Chris Boylan at the Township cboylan@eastgoshen.org or 610-692-7171.

1010 Hershey Mill Road Land Development – Conditional Use Hearing Set for January 17th

The property at 1010 Hershey Mill Road is currently going through a process known as *Conditional Use* (*CU*) which will include an upcoming hearing in front of the Board of Supervisors to determine the proposed use by a developer. The CU is currently for a proposed subdivision of 13-15 (final design still not done) new single-family homes on the property, which totals over 15 acres.

If there is any interest in this hearing, it will be in conjunction with the regularly scheduled board meeting on **Tuesday**, **January 17**th **at 7:00 PM**.

If you cannot make it there will still be opportunity for public discussion in the first half of 2023 as the developer will still need to go through the land development process in front of the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors after the *Conditional Use* process is completed.

Infant Supplies Drive: WEGO held a drive for infant supplies to donate to a local women and



Winter Weather and Snow Removal



Pre-storm Preparedness Checklist:

- No on-street parking to allow efficient and safe plowing/salting
- Clear snow from any fire hydrants on or new your property
- Keep a safe distance from all plow trucks
- Avoid all unnecessary travel
- Have a 7-day supply of all medications
- Have 1 gallon of water per person per day on hand
- Have a 3 day supply of non-perishable food
- Have baby supplies, diapers, formula etc.
- Flashlights and batteries
- Radio battery operated
- Blankets
- Full tank of propane for grill
- Have your gas tank filled
- Have your pets inside; make sure they have 7- day supply of food
- Have dry wood in a garage or covered for the fireplace or woodstove

Mailbox Maintenance:

- 1. Expensive/Ornate mailboxes should be removed with a basic mailbox for the winter months
- 2. Mailboxes should be located so the face of the box is 6 8 inches from the edge of the curb. This is according to USPS guidelines. We suggest to put them as far as 15 inches back from the road edge.
- 3. Is your mailbox sturdy? Plastic mailboxes tend to become brittle from the sun's UV rays. Make sure the door on the mailbox is closed tightly. If the door is missing or open the mailbox is sure to "fold" on impact of the snow.
- 4. The East Goshen Township Board of Supervisors have passed a resolution that states the Township will reimburse a resident \$25.00 for replacement or repair for a damaged mailbox, provided the resident has advised the Township of said damages within one week of the snow removal operation. The Township does not repair any mailboxes.



Snow Removal



- 1. We put a layer of brine on the road before the snow event starts; this prevents snow from bonding to the pavement and creating ice.
- 2. Then we put a layer of salt down on the roads when the snow event starts.
- 3. Once the snow starts to accumulate the plows begin to make one pass in and out of every street until the snow stops.
- 4. When the snow stops we begin to clear the streets by pushing the snow to the curb.
- 5. When clearing your driveway **do not** deposit the snow into the roadway; this can cause hazardous conditions to other motorists.
- 6. Cul-de-sacs and storm drains are the final areas to be cleaned up after a storm.

Important Information on Snow Removal:

- 1. Do Not park on the street during a snow event.
- 2. When shoveling your driveway leave the last six feet of your driveway un-shoveled until the plowing has ceased. This un-shoveled part will allow the snow being pushed by the plow to remain on the plow and not into your driveway.
- 3. The Township does not plow residential driveways.
- 4. If an ambulance has been called to an address in the Township we will help bring in the emergency vehicle.
- 5. Please bear in mind; we cannot be everywhere at once. We will plow all roads in order of traffic priority, the main roads then secondary roads.
- 6. Our snow plow drivers are asked to take precautions to avoid striking mailboxes with their plows but snow can be extremely heavy and a cold brittle mail box can come down easily.

East Goshen Municipal Authority

Investing For Our Future

The East Goshen Municipal Authority (EGMA) is responsible for the management and disposal of effluent wastewater generated in East Goshen Township. Approximately 30% of that wastewater is handled by our own plant, the Ridley Creek Sewage Treatment Plant, located near Towne Drive in the east end of the township. The remainder is transferred by a series of pumping stations to the West Goshen Wastewater Treatment Plant on South Concord Road, operated by the West Goshen Sewer Authority.

The EGMA, which is a legally separate entity from the Township, is responsible for financing the construction, expansion, monitoring, and upgrade of the Township's sewage collection and treatment infrastructure. Currently, there are several construction projects which the EGMA is implementing. These include:

Ridley Creek Sewer Treatment Plant (RCSTP)

- UV (ultraviolet) Disinfection System Replacement Existing system replacement UV bulbs are not available since the installed proprietary system is no longer manufactured. The system was installed in 2010. An application has been submitted for a Local Share Account (LSA) grant; that grant would pay for the majority of the project construction cost. Construction is scheduled for 2023.
- Caustic Soda Project to improve worker safety and efficiency at the plant. Caustic soda is currently added in the treatment process by workers carrying 50-pound bags of caustic soda and pouring directly into the treatment tanks. The new system will inject liquid caustic soda directly into the treatment tanks. The caustic soda storage tank and feed pumps are currently (Fall 2022) being installed at the RCSTP.
- Influent Flow Meter This project is the replacement of the influent flow meter system at the RCSTP. The new meter pit has been constructed and a new meter is currently (Fall 2022) being installed.

Hershey Mill Estates Trunk Sewer Replacement - this project is the replacement of approximately 2,700 linear feet of 8-inch sanitary sewer in the Hershey's Mill Estates development. The existing sewer pipe has experienced settlement, collapse, clogging, back-up, and maintenance problems. Design and permitting for the project are complete. An application has been submitted for a LSA grant; that grant would pay for the majority of the project construction cost. Construction is scheduled for 2023.

Supplee Valley Sewer Pipe Lining - this project is the lining of the remaining asbestos sewers in the neighborhood. Sewer pipe lining is a process used for the repair of cracked, leaking, backed-up, and damaged sewer lines. Using a no-dig trenchless process, sewer lining involves inserting new epoxy saturated pipe tubing into existing pipes, inflating the tubing, and curing it in-place. A portion of the Supplee Valley sewer pipe lining was completed in 2021; the remainder is expected to be completed in 2023.

Any questions may be directed to members of the East Goshen Municipal Authority, which meets monthly on the second Monday of the month at 7:00p.m. in the Township Building.

Now that our mission has expanded beyond its original scope, it is our privilege to be working even harder to assist and inform our neighbors living in East helping the environment, but reducing costs for our Goshen Township.

We have launched a Facebook and Instagram account on which we post suggestions several times each week for residents and visitors to live more sustainably. If you are a Facebook or Instagram user, we hope you will friend us! You can find us at East Goshen Esac. Our very first post was passed along and picked up on other pages, one of which has been liked over 300,000 times!

Mark the date of

Saturday, April 15th on your calendars for what we expect will be our second annual Sustainability Expo. This was so well received last year that West Goshen Township has approached us about offering a joint Expo this year. Stay tuned! We will need more space, so have reserved our EGT Park for that date.

Are you considering solar panels? The Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), passed recently brings back federal tax credits for solar installations to 30%. They were set to expire at the end of 2023. With electricity and heating prices dramatically increasing, now is a great time to explore solar options. Many who have installed solar have eliminated several months worth of their total electric bill. In some cases, their total annual electricity bill has been wiped out! For more detailed information, go to: Federal Solar Tax Credit Resources Department of Energy.

Finally, given the increased costs of services, materials and labor facing our Township, we have a few questions to ask of our residents in our capacity as advisers to the East Goshen Supervisors on

environmental and sustainability issues. If you agree with any of these suggestions, not only will you be Township.

1. At present recyclable items are picked up once a week, and trash is picked up twice a week. Many communities are moving towards a once a week schedule for trash pick up, thereby offsetting their communal carbon footprint by burning less fossil fuels with low mile per gallon trash vehicles on the roads less often. Residents can put out extra trash cans if needed, so this does not necessarily cut truck traffic in half, if the trash load remains the same. Some trucks may need to do a few extra trips each week, but most communities do find a substantial reduction in carbon emissions, along with reduced costs in vehicle maintenance and labor. Is your household willing to consider once a week pick up for trash, as well as a weekly pick up for recyclables?

EGT is committed to an aggressive recycling campaign, even though costs associated with recycling are increasing. Is your household willing to make a concerted effort to purchase less items in plastic packaging? To refuse single use plastic bags by bringing your own multi-use bags to shop? And finally, to consider a single use plastic bag ban for East Goshen, as West Goshen and West Chester Borough have already done? (Some retailers are already doing this.)



East Goshen Township - Parks and Recreation Pavilion Rental FAQ

We have a new process on how to reserve a pavilion and an updated permit application. We will begin accepting permits for 2023 on January 3. Click here for the new pavilion permit application. Please see below for the updated park pavilion permit information.

Pavilion Rental Season - March 1 to December 31. Rentals can only be made for the current calendar year.

Group Size: Groups larger than 25 are required to submit a permit. Any organized group no matter the size wanting to use the pavilion for a specific date must submit a permit to guarantee the pavilion.

Pavilion Locations: Ira Hicks Pavilion is near the playground and the preferred pavilion for children's birthday parties. Veterans Pavilion is near the football field and is better for privacy and ADA Bathroom needs. Both pavilions have picnic tables, grills, electric, water access and are close to a bathroom facility. Grills are for charcoal only. No propane grills are permitted.

Time: We offer two time slots (9:00am to 2:00pm or 3:00pm to Dusk) or renting it for the entire day. Your allotted time includes set up and clean up.

Refunds: A refund will be given if you notify East Goshen Township Parks and Recreation by email the night prior to your rental.

How to reserve a pavilion: We will hold your time and date for one week. After one week if we do not have your completed application and payment you are forfeiting your date and time slot.

Other Facility Request: Tennis/ Pickle Ball Courts, Bocce Court, Basketball Court and Ball Fields require a separate permit and fees if you want to use it during your rental.

Third Party Vendors: You may have moon bounces and other inflatables from a third party vendor. You need to provide copy of their Liability Insurance naming East Goshen as an Additional Insured.


Attention: Change in Trash Collection Dates Upcoming on January 1st!
